Striper Fish Update

The VMRC took away the slot (28-34 inches) in the striper regulations. Now the bay season that runs from Oct 4-Dec 31 is two fish per person. Fish have to be over 18 inches and less than 28 inches, although one of the two allowed can be over 28 inches.

Dogfish catch limit increase

Catch limit for dogfish increased for 2012 fishing year. The catch limit for commercial fishermen targeting dogfish has increased by more than 5 million pounds over last year, a significant increase that reflects the abundance of the species.

The commercial quota has been set at 35.694 million pounds or 16,191 metric tons and the overall catch for the 2012 fishing year has been set at 44.737 million pounds or 20,292 metric tons, the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration announced on Tuesday. The new measures went into effect July 1.

Spiny dogfish were declared overfished in 1998 requiring conservation measures to rebuild the stock. Those measures proved successful and the stock was declared to be rebuilt in 2010, allowing regulators to permit much larger catches. In 2010 the catch limit was 15 million pounds and it was just 10 million pounds the previous year.

The new catch limit for 2012 is expected to result in positive economic impacts for the spiny dogfish fishery, according to a release from NOAA. Once regarded as trash fish, a number of waterfront businesses in New Bedford now process dogfish which, along with skate wings, are sold mostly in the European market.

VBAC Member Info

Doink has the applications which contain the Group Member number on them. Let him know if you need the application or Group Cooperating Number. We need 6 members to use this discount for us to keep it.

The VBAC Fishing Roulette

The second VBAC Fishing Roulette Challenge is underway. The five species of fish for 2012 are: sunfish, blue catfish, chain pickerel, flounder, and tautog. 26 people signed up and will be competing for the prize money. The angler with the heaviest catch for the selected species by Dec 31, 2012 will share the pot with the other winners. Weight will determine winner (not length).

Fishing Tales

'Weather' to Go or Stay, flounder and sheep report August 27 2012 weight citation by Beth Synowiec

Kevin and I had originally planned on going to some offshore wrecks today. When we checked the weather, we saw thunderstorms on the horizon and decided to stay safe and just fish inshore. We then decided to pull up to CH wreck and we dropped our lines. We were both using live bait with a standard 3 way & 4/0 hook rig with 10 to 12 oz of weight. Within 38 minutes I had limit. Within an hour we had 6 nice keepers in the box. Bite was solid for a good 45 minutes and then stopped due to a kicking current. It became hard to hold position so we stuck around for another 20 minutes and then left. We had some crab on board and decided to see about some sheep. It would be a while before the current would allow us to sheep hunt so we made the best of that time. I kicked back and finally ate some breakfast and then slammed a water and a Gatorade. Then it rained hard for a good 30 minutes. We stayed until the rain subsided and then finally were able to drop our lines. It was still before noon. Kevin drops his line and in a matter of minutes his rod tip goes nuts and his reel starts singing the sheep song...SWEET I thought! I pulled my line up and grabbed the net. The fight lasted a good 5 minutes and I could tell this fish was a heavy one when I lifted it with the net into the boat...25 inch beauty! We stuck around for a little while longer and even though we still had bait the sky began to look like another storm was approaching...this one looked larger and more dangerous from the clouds. We chose the safe route and headed back to the ramp. Not even 2 minutes after I drove the boat onto the trailer, I turned around and saw lightning hit the water. Better safe than sorry I thought. Congrats to Kevin on his largest sheep to date: 11 lbs 4 oz!

What to do on a Wed...A Classicrockfish Citation Sheepshead Report for Aug 22 2012 by Beth Synowiec. So what do you do when you actually end up having a few hours free in the morning on a Wed? You go sheepshead fishing, of course...and so we did. Kevin and I headed out to the CBBT area around 7:30 AM and we hit more than our fair share of pilings. About 20 minutes after the hunt began, I had a 18 1/2 inch tog on the boat that bit on a fiddler; then Kevin pulled in a nice 17 1/2 on a fiddler shortly after that...they were both welcome additions to the box. We continued our search and then it finally happened around 10:30 AM, Kevin's line went screaming and the 25 lb line snapped & got the last word. A few minutes later, the same thing happened on my line. We rigged with some heavier 40lb test and boy am I glad we did. Within about 15 minutes, I hear Kevin yell out "oh hell yeah!" and his rod tip buckles over and then the classic sheepshead "insta smile" appears on his face. Then he yells it's a "sheep!" I quickly grabbed the net to help Kevin. His fish took drag multiple times but soon approached the boat. Kevin had worked up a sweat and then another minute later a 24 inch bait snatcher appeared. We took a few photos and then Kevin released it back. About 25 minutes go by and it's my turn now. ZZZZZZZ the pole does a double take, I continue to crank as the pole bends like crazy. This fish zipped, pummeled, and continued to take some serious drag! I was concerned it may break the line at one point so although I kept cranking I tried my best not to muscle the fish too much...but then it headed for some rocks. I cranked harder. I got him up half way and zip down again he went. The fight lasted about 5 minutes and was fantastic! Kevin grabbed the net and he boated my just shy of 25 inch beauty... the fish looked like it could be a weight citation. I debated and then said what the heck, and threw it in the box. Then Kevin lost another one due to the sheep's innate crafty bait stealing abilities. Katie then called me on the phone asking about her school orientation. Clara too had something for school! She had to go to as well. We had only about 30 more minutes until we had to call it. I kept thinking how much I would like a release citation before we had to go. About 20 minutes later, down to the last few minutes we had, my line starts zipping like it is on fire! I cranked down on it and wham "fish on!" This one fought like a champ but not as rough as my first. I get the convict to the boat and measured it. It measured at 24 1/2 inches but actually felt heavier in weight than my first. Now I had a decision to make. I took a couple silly photos with it first (see last 2 photos) and then let it go. It was 12:10 PM and we had to leave! We secured the boat and headed back and reached the dock by 12:50 PM. What a great morning on the water!
