

I just got back from a trip of a lifetime to Elfin Cove, Alaska. The island is a 70-mile float plane ride from Juneau, and sixteen guys made up the group I traveled with. We stayed at Tanaku Lodge, an all inclusive facility, which meant I didn't have to cook anything! The food was very good, and the baking even better!

Fishing was terrific as you can tell from the pictures. We caught fifteen halibut over 100 lbs. each and kept six of them. Regulations allowed us to take one 30 to 38-inch halibut per man per day. Boat regulations are very stringent. You need a tag for the big halibuts; we got four from the lodge and then had to purchase two tags at a cost of \$88.00 per man.

Each guy brought home approximately 100 lbs. of fillets from the trip. — Jerry Mariano

















Jerry Hughes went out alone at least twice this past month and had some really good results.



July 14 - 42" 12 mile marker, home by noon

Spadefishing at 3rd Island 7/3/18

I went fishing with Russell out in his 19 ft Mako out to the CBBT 3rd Island looking for Atlantic Spadefish (the official name for this species). We launched from Crab Creek and went out in the ebb tide with a ripping current and east wind which kept our stern pointed at the spine the whole time. We set up a clam chum to attract them and had our rigs set up with bobbers with sea clam on the hooks. We weren't there at the spine of the tunnel for more than 5 minutes and we had our bobbers go down for small ones with edible ones mixed in. We probably caught over 20 and settled for 6 keepers to eat. But big or small they were a blast to catch and it wore our arms out. Biggest was around 5 lbs. Fished for 3 hours and came in exhausted.

I thought I should update you on Dominion Powers' progress toward offshore wind energy off Virginia's coast and notify you about some upcoming activity in our ocean. Please consider providing your help and support.

Beginning very early in August, a contractor will begin exploring the cable route to the offshore wind site with side scan sonar and magnetometers. I have attached a document that provides greater detail for those of you who fish the proposed cable area. The primary objective of the survey is to discover any unexploded ordinances that lay in the cable path. These would obviously be a serious problem when the cable is laid and buried. To accomplish this survey safely and efficiency they need all bottom gear removed from the cable route and clear, unobstructed travel as they tow their sensors along the route.

Dominion Power has hired Sea Risk Solutions to be the fisheries liaison, the interface between Dominion and recreational and commercial fishermen. Mr. Wolfgang Rain is Sea Risk Solutions' representative. He will be visiting as many ports as possible to answer to inform fishermen of the upcoming project and answer any questions you may have. I have attached Sea Risk Solutions' document describing the project and listing Mr. Rain's contact information.

Dominion Power will start with two offshore turbines as a 'demonstration project' to learn about offshore wind's potential, develop the most cost efficient way to build the turbines and test turbine structures in the Virginia environment, including the potential for damage from hurricanes.

Below are answers to questions posed to Mr. Rain in a recent meeting that may be of interest to you:

- 1. Expected start date? Possible as early as August 1st.
- 2. What happens if there is still gear in the water? Gear may be snagged, damaged and lost.
- 3. How long will the project take? Probably until October.
- 4. Will sections of the route be opened after they are surveyed? They are waiting for the surveyors to answer that question. They may have to go back to previously surveyed areas for more detail.
- 5. Will the public be notified at start and completion: Yes.
- 6. Will there be vessels in the area to notify fishermen of the need to get through an area? Probably.
- 7. Could the project be delayed by severe weather? Yes.
- 8. Are there any environmental effects from the sonar and magnetometer gear? No.
- 9. How wide an area do they need to survey? .5 nautical miles to either side of the cable route.
- 10. Will the survey continue at night? Yes.

As soon as the survey ship is selected, I will send out a picture of the ship so that you will know it When you see it.


Now that the project is under way, it is important that we all pay attention. Mr. Rain is our contact for commenting on any issues related to the the cable route and depth, the demonstration turbines and the wind farm that will most likely follow. Input from both recreational and commercial fishermen will be considered in the finer scale 'micro-siting' of the wind farm turbines. It appears that they are sincere about causing as little disruption as possible.

This project should provide some great structure for both recreational and commercial fishermen.

PLEASE RETAIN RED DORSAL TAG AND GREEN ABBOMHNAL TAG WITH ELECTRONIC TAGS

In order to receive your reward please do the following steps:

- 1. Call us!
- 2. Record: -- total length -- date -- location of capture
- Take photos
- 4. If harvesting find electronic tags in abdominal cavity: pull on green external tag then clip off red external tag
- If releasing please retain red tag for \$100 reward, and leave green tag intact.
- Return all tags to us.

Researchers at the Virginia Institute of Marine Science (VIMS) and North Carolina State University are tagging cobia with surgically implanted electronic tags: acoustic transmitters and data loggers. The transmitters allow the fish to be detected by receivers that are located all along the East Coast. However, the data logger needs to be returned in order to download the data. You must follow all applicable state and federal fishing regulations. Not all fish have all tags. Thank you for returning tags.

Vibrio - A Dangerous problem. Causes, Risks, and Who is at Risk

If you are in an area where hurricanes, <u>storm surges</u>, and coastal flooding are possible, it's important for you to know about a harmful bacteria called *Vibrio vulnificus* and steps you can take to reduce your risk of infection.

Questions and Answers

What is Vibrio vulnificus?

Vibrio vulnificus is one of about a dozen species of *Vibrio* bacteria that can cause human illness, called <u>vibriosis</u>. *Vibrio* naturally live in certain coastal waters and are present in higher concentrations between May and October when water temperatures are warmer. Those months overlap with the time when hurricanes and tropical storms are more likely to affect the U.S. mainland and many U.S. territories.

Who is more likely to get a Vibrio vulnificus infection?

Anyone can get a *Vibrio vulnificus* infection. People with a compromised immune system or liver disease are more likely to get an infection and severe complications. <u>Learn about other medical conditions that increase your chance of infection</u>.

How do people get a Vibrio vulnificus infection?

In the United States, people most often become infected with *Vibrio vulnificus* and other species of *Vibrio* by eating raw or undercooked shellfish, particularly <u>oysters</u>. Certain *Vibrio* species, including *Vibrio vulnificus*, can also cause a skin infection when an open wound is exposed to brackish or salt water. Brackish water is a mixture of fresh and sea water that is often found where rivers meet the sea.

When a hurricane or storm surge causes flooding, you may be exposed to coastal water. If you are in a group more likely to get a *Vibrio vulnificus* infection, it is especially important to take steps to reduce your risk of infection.

Learn how to reduce your risk of *Vibrio* infection from <u>raw or undercooked oysters or other shellfish</u> or contact with their juices.

How can I protect myself from a *Vibrio vulnificus* infection during hurricanes and other natural disasters?

You can reduce your risk of infection by following these tips regarding wounds:

- Stay out of brackish or salt water if possible if you have a wound. Cover your wound with a waterproof bandage if there's a possibility it could come into contact with brackish or salt water, raw seafood, or raw seafood juices.
- Wash wounds and cuts thoroughly with soap and water if they have been exposed to brackish or salt water, or raw seafood or its juices.
- If you develop a skin infection, tell your medical provider if your skin has come into contact with brackish or salt water, raw seafood, or raw seafood juices.

Wounded during a disaster? Learn how to take care of minor wounds and when to seek medical care.

What kinds of illnesses can a Vibrio vulnificus infection cause?

Vibrio vulnificus can cause two types of illnesses: 1) wound infections, which may start as redness and swelling at the site of the wound that can spread to affect much of the body, and 2) primary septicemia, a bloodstream infection with symptoms including fever, dangerously low blood pressure, and blistering skin lesions.

Are Vibrio vulnificus infections serious?

Yes. People with a *Vibrio vulnificus* infection can get seriously ill and need intensive care or limb amputation. About 1 in 7 people with a *Vibrio vulnificus* wound infection dies.

Vibrio vulnificus does not cause cholera. Cholera is an epidemic waterborne diarrheal disease caused by another type of *Vibrio*; cholera rarely occurs in developed nations.




Freshwater Fishing News Continued

Russell and Ike at Lake Prince 7/26/18

Russell and I went fishing in the Lake Prince starting at 7 am and looking for shellcrackers primarily but hoping in the morning for bass on shiners. We didn't catch a thing in the morning but small shellcrackers. So we went out to the end of the lake and worked eastward looking for places and depths that we thought should hold some shellcrackers. We worked the whole lake but could only find small ones until Russell hooked a big fish on his ultra light rod. It pulled line and worked itself all around the boat for an exciting 15-20 minutes until we could see it was a catfish. Russell really had to finesse this cat as it pulled drag if you tried to pressure it to the surface or towards the net. It weighed out at 8 lbs on my scale. Great catch. Then nothing happened until we worked our way back down the lake until we settle into our favorite cove. This cove has produced my citations and VBAC roulette winner sunfishes in 2016 so we covered it thoroughly. And it did not disappoint me. I hooked up with a 1 lb 5 oz shellcracker at exactly 4pm. While she gave me a tough fight it was not exceptional and quickly netted. This catch is consistent with all of our catches in previous years. After 3pm on red wigglers, very fresh and in 10-15 ft.
