

Every little bit helps and will make someone's holiday a little brighter. Thank-you again for all of your support.



Time: Lines in 8:00am - Weigh-in 4:00pm.

Location: Lake Smith (boat and shore), Little Creek Reservoir (boat only).

Gates open at 7:00 AM

Entry Fees: \$20.00 per Angler, \$10.00 for children under 16.

Registration: Register on day of tournament at judge's table in Lake Smith parking

lot before fishing.

Boat check before entering water.

Norfolk lakes day permit for boats/kayaks available if desired.

Prize paid on the heaviest single fish.

Except for shore anglers, and angler may win only one place.

Shore anglers may win shore & crappie tournament prize. (see below).

Shore anglers may enter any fish caught during competition. A single prize will be awarded to the overall largest fish caught from shore irrespective of species. Should a crappie be caught by a shore angler, it may be entered in the tournament as a crappie catch in addition to entering for the shore prize.

Use of all nets (except landing net) will disqualify angler.

Early catch submission is permitted.

All entries must be in by the 4:00 pm weigh-in time at judging table. Judging will take place and winners announced at conclusion of weigh-in.

Ties will be decided by the earliest entry.

Dear Secretary Ross:

The Atlantic States Marine Fisheries Commission (ASMFC) recently voted unanimously to find Virginia out of compliance with the interstate fishery management plan for Atlantic menhaden. The Commonwealth of Virginia voted in favor of this finding because the data show clearly that the harvest cap of 51,000 metric tons (more than 112 million pounds) for the industrial purse seine fishery in Virginia's portion of the Chesapeake Bay has been exceeded. Compliance with this cap is necessary to conserve menhaden and other fisheries that depend on this important forage fish for their survival. These fisheries are an important part of our nation's economy.

Only one company participates in the industrial purse seine fishery – Omega Protein Corporation, a subsidiary of the Canadian firm Cooke, Inc. Despite direct appeals by Virginia's Marine Resources Commissioner and myself that Omega and Cooke abide by the 51,000 metric ton limit, the company has continued over-harvesting menhaden from the Chesapeake Bay even after exceeding the cap. This has resulted in tens of millions of American fish being exported to feed farmed salmon in Canada, in violation of the ASMFC quota.

Given these actions by an international company, imposing a moratorium on the menhaden harvest is the most appropriate way to bring about a shift to responsible management of menhaden, consistent with Section 5106(a) of the Atlantic Coastal Fisheries Cooperative Management Act. Imposing a moratorium immediately will prevent Omega and Cooke from pushing farther past the quota for 2019. A moratorium will also provide the motivation necessary to ensure that Virginia's General Assembly puts in place new measures to ensure future compliance with ASMFC fishery management plans, which are a shining example of the kind of

cooperative federalism your Administration supports. A moratorium is the appropriate next step after a formal finding of non-compliance, according to the Act.

Section 5106(a) of ACFCMA requires the Secretary of Commerce to make a finding on the non-compliance recommendation within 30 days of being notified by ASMFC. Therefore, pursuant to Sec. 5106(b) of ACFCMA, I am requesting a meeting between your office and Virginia's Secretary of Natural Resources Matthew Strickler to discuss the Commonwealth's support for the ASMFC non-compliance finding, as well as our interest in the conservation of Atlantic menhaden, in advance of you making such a finding.



Here is a striper report and an "action" photo of me fishing Pretty Lake. If you find a calm day you can get out they are hitting on surface plugs and Rattle Traps all around the end of the jetties.

#### Striper's at the Little Creek

Fished with Louis and Jesse on 11/19/19 at sunup at the Little Creek jetties for stripers and found them hitting our ChugBugs top water lures. It was calm on the water an when we positioned ourselves to cast parallel with the jetty and close to the rocks we found them. We caught 7 but only kept our limit of one per person 21-23 inches. Great fun on top water lures, totally visual and explosive. Louis and I had tried the night before at dusk but only found one striper lost at the boat and one puppy drum so this was a great relief to catch this morning. We tried for specks in the area and Pretty Lake but nothing but small ones.

### Chef's Corner: Go from Eight & Bait to Plate the Bait!

#### DECEMBER 2019

For those anglers tired of discarding expensive unused bait after a day in the surf or on the water, these ideas transform fresh bait into fine table fare!

Eight ounces of weight and fresh bait cast into a slough along the OBX shoreline is a mantra for anglers pursuing large Red Drum. This article puts a tasty twist on the old "8 & Bait" mantra!

The recurring theme throughout my Chef's Corner series is the ethical and responsible utilization of every inch and every ounce of the fish and game harvested during our outdoors adventures.

This article extends that theme to an oft-overlooked part of our overall angling experience – fresh bait.

That's right - BAIT!

Far too often I see anglers afford little care to the preservation and maintenance of fresh baits such as shrimp, squid, clams, crab, fish, and more.

I can't change the world in a day, but why not treat our bait like we were going to eat it at the end of the day?

Many years ago, I participated in a three-day surf fishing school with OBX master surf fisherman Joe Malat. Joe has authored several books on surf fishing and is very well respected throughout the Coastal Carolinas.

One of the greatest take-aways I retained from that experience pertained to the use of the freshest bait possible as essential to success in the surf.

Joe simply said:

#### "Never use a bait that you would not be willing to eat yourself."

I never forgot that, and on many occasions, I have witnessed those with the freshest bait having more success in catching while others fished. Of course, live bait is as fresh as it gets, but icing and cold storage immediately after securing fresh bait prolongs freshness and slows the natural degradation which otherwise follows.

"Fresh Frozen" will do in a pinch, but "Fresh-Fresh" is always the way to go, and some baits freeze better than others!

So here we go – I hope you enjoy reading this as much as I did writing it!!

#### Common "Baits" that Make Great Table Fare:

Knowing what to do with fresh bait after the fishing day is done is a great insurance policy for those great days of fishing that don't result in much catching!

While not all bait is practically edible, most natural baits are equally as palatable to us and the fish we target!

Here are a few of the most notable baits that are convert to fine table fare:

- Fresh Mullet
- Fresh Shrimp
- Fresh Squid
- Fresh Clams
- Fresh Live Sand Fleas (yes, they are excellent!)
- Fresh Blue Crabs
- Other Fresh food fish such as Spot, Croaker, or Bluefish
- Sorry, Fresh Live Bloodworms didn't make the list!

While this article does not provide any detailed recipes, it does offer a visual history of many of the dishes that I have created from

leftover bait that was properly cared for from the field to the kitchen. I also list several new recipes that I am in the process of documenting, and to be honest, once you embrace the concept of edible bait, the sky is the limit!

In any case, many of these dishes would easily pass the taste test in the poshest restaurants and kitchens, so open up your mind and enjoy these great suggestions on how to utilize every ounce and every inch of your fresh bait!

#### Put Your Bait on A Plate!

Until now, unused bait was either discarded or haphazardly preserved for later use in a far less palatable state. That does not have to happen ever again! As much money as we spend on our bait, why not recover every penny of our investment?

As the pictures above and list below demonstrates, it makes far more sense to eat today's fresh bait and start anew tomorrow with a – pardon the pun – "Fresh Start!"!

Just look at the diversity of these dishes which I recently created using leftover bait as the main ingredient:

- Mullet Poppers –these fried delicacies are excellent served with sweet chili sauce or homemade tartar sauce!
- Shrimp Po' Boys –fry them up in a crispy batter to serve on hoagie or hot dog rolls with shredded lettuce, cheddar, pickle, tartar sauce, and a side of fries...you can also chop cut bait or clams and fry crispy for this!

### Cape Hatteras Anglers Club (CHAC) Surf Fishing Tournament

VBAC Teams, Individual Anglers, and Volunteer Judges got to experience the Tale of Two Seasons in the World's Largest Surf Fishing Tournament!

Special Thanks go out to Kay Knowles and the Cape Hatteras Angler's Club (CHAC) Tournament Staff and Volunteers for their hospitality and for hosting another great tournament on Hatteras Island!

This year's Team Competition was held 06-08 November 2019, and the Bob Bernard Open Individual Tournament took place on Saturday, 09 November.

VBAC anglers competed in both events, and three VBAC anglers served as volunteer judges during the Team competition.

The Team competition included 120 of the most competitive surf fishing teams in the country.

Day 1 was a near perfect day with warm temperatures, light winds, and light surf – a truly great day to be alive!

Day 2 was a complete opposite. High winds and rough surf on Day 2 required hard work, perseverance, and a capability to fish heavy weights and rigs. Nevertheless, several teams moved sharply up the standings with some quality catches in tough conditions!

VBAC entered two teams consisting of six anglers each.

Team 1 recorded 20 fish and 29 points, which kept them on the left side of the leaderboard with a respectable 46<sup>th</sup> place overall finish out of 120 teams.

Team 2 finished the tournament with five scorable fish and six points, placing them in 100<sup>th</sup> place out of 120 teams.

Kelly Hoggard was the top VBAC scorer with 8 fish for 13 points, but Patty Searby was hot on his heels with 8 fish and 11 points!

Kelly also recorded the largest fish with a 14.75-inch Kingfish.

Day 3 was still a bit windy but very fishable for the individual tournament which included three VBAC anglers and just over 50 participants.

Bryan Watkins won the Individual award for the largest Sea Mullet caught, and Kelly Hoggard finished second in the Black Drum category.

In addition, John Germanos, Doug Wehner, and Carol Wehner served as volunteer judges during the Team Competition.

All-in-all, VBAC was well represented, and the tournament once again lived up to its billing as the mozt prestigious surf fishing event in the country.

On Day 2, the weather presented all anglers with challenging conditions that featured temperatures in the 40s and winds gusting to 30 mph. Greg managed to score the lone fish for 1 point in the morning session.

The Team was only slightly better in the final session with 2 fish for 4 points. Patty once again led the way with 1 fish and 3 points.

The Individual even took place on Saturday, 9 November 2019 from 8 am until noon. The boundary included most of Hatteras Island from Ramps 23 to 55, excluding Cape Point. Just over 50 seasoned anglers competed, and there was some stiff competition. Three VBAC anglers fished together in the individual event: Bryan Watkins, Patty Searby, and Kelly Hoggard.

The trio started the day on Ramp 34, which was where the Kingfish (aka Sea Mullet or Roundhead) bite was good early in the week. Residual gale force winds challenged our anglers' skills, but they found a hole that held a few fish.

Bryan had a solid bite about 20 minutes into the session. After getting the fish up to the beach, it was a beautiful 15.5-inch Northern Kingfish. Shortly after, Kelly pulled a surf fishing personal best 17-inch Black Drum out of the same hole. They worked the spot a little longer, but the falling tide led to poor fishing conditions, so they moved on in search of another hot stretch of beach.

Our VBAC Three moved south to Ramp 49 to get the wind at their backs and fish a flat area inside a break on a distant bar. Though it was much nicer fishing conditions, the fishing was slow. They caught a Bluefish and a Puffer on a handful of bites.

With time dwindling, they strategically moved back north and worked the Ramp 38 beach for the final 30 minutes.

Kelly had one solid bite but failed to land the fish. A nearby angler not competing in the event beached a very nice Black

Drum that would have beaten Kelly's 17-incher, but to no avail!

The VBAC Three were the first group to arrive for the weigh-in. They weighed three fish:

Bryan's Kingfish (called a sea mullet on Hatteras Island), and Kelly's Black Drum and Bluefish.

They waited in anticipation as anglers pulled up to weigh their fish. Slowly, Kelly's two fish were taken off the board, but Bryan's 1-pound 6-ounce Kingfish held strong with no other fish of that species coming close.


Bryan won the "Largest Sea Mullet" award, and Kelly took second in the Black Drum category, only 4 ounces behind the winner. Kelly's Bluefish was eclipsed by some very nice 18-20" Blues brought to the scale.

#### Submitted by Kelly Hoggard:

#### Mission Accomplished!

It's been a SIX year journey to this point. I set a goal a while back to get a citation Roundhead (Kingfish/Sea Mullet) in the state of Virginia. Every time I go surf fishing in Virginia, I specifically target this species. It's been a passion for me to learn as much as I could about being a proficient roundhead fisherman. While it's not a true sea monster, this size of kingfish is a rare catch in Virginia. Of the three roundhead I caught today, they represent the 1st, 3rd, and 4th largest of my career in Virginia Beach.

I set up this morning shortly before sunrise in sandbridge. I fished through the 7:30 am high tide with little success. The only thing in the surf appeared to be small black drum and baby spots. The speckled trout bite picked up as the water fell. As a big wave whitewashed through my zone, I had a heavy run on one of the rods. When it came in on the wave, the fish turned out to be a smooth dog shark. It's the first I've seen since the spring. It gave me hope that the roundhead were here because they were mixed in with the roundhead in March/April in the OBX.


I had three more runs over the next 15 minutes, each roundhead bigger than the last. The second measured in at 15" and weighed in at 1 lb 6 oz on my scale. It was a thick fish. With that fish still in my hand, I saw another run and picked it up. This one was bigger and I knew instantly I had the fish I've been searching for. I feel as though I've been jinxed lately, especially with my most recent catch, so I put the scale away and immediately put this fish under my ice bag. Unfortunately, that was almost it. I only caught 2 more fish in the next 2 hours.

I noticed the rain creeping my way from the oceanfront. I packed up a few minutes too late. Heavy winds came at about noon with cold rain. My body and gear were sandblasted until I was able to get off the beach. I've included a picture that shows the sand blowing on my gear. I also took a picture of the water to show people the way the fishing hole looked. It takes a talented eye to read the beach. I've found that low tide is always the best time to read the surf and get setup if you're looking for a new spot. Sometimes the hole that's good for fishing is very small, even a few square feet of different bottom can be a great fishing spot.

THANK YOU to anyone that's supported me along the way. Whether that was just joining me for a day of surf fishing, or helping evolve my fishing skills by making new rigs. It's all attributed to the completion of my goal. You know who you are.









Citation Speck in the Surf 11/3/19 by Kelly Hoggard.

I get some weird looks when I tell people that I've never caught a speckled trout big enough to be a keeper. Truth is, I've never targeted or fished for them before. But that all changed today.

My goal was to find a nice hole to fish for roundhead. I checked a few areas at low tide but failed to find a good location. I switched gears and targeted an area I've fished previously. I set up to surf fish a little after sunrise on daylight savings Sunday. This location had a good setup for a big red drum. In three casts with only one rod, I had 3 quick bluefish. There's no size to them but at least I know the bite would be there. I set up a fish finder on the second rig and cast an 8 n bait all day with my 12 footer. I got the occasional bluefish bite and caught the only 2 runs I had all day. One shark and one stingray.

By 9 am, the wind was really picking up. A healthy chop was settling in and the wind was straight down the beach. It was a little chilly, but that was manageable so long as you are dry. I got into a couple of small specks in a small hole near the shore. I noticed my line go slack so I pulled it in to find out what happened. As it came tight, the return tug was significant. I took my time and got a good wave to help pull the fish up the beach. At first, I though I might have had a solid puppy drum. This wasn't a puppy drum however. It was a huge speckled trout. I raced to get it in the bucket of water and get it measured. It measured 24 and 3/8ths inches. Suddenly, I realized I didn't know what the state citation sizes were. So now I'm scrambling to find this information out. After confirming it was a citation, I quickly tagged my first ever keeper speckled trout so it could be released. The fish was certainly tired by now. I bit my tongue and waded out into the water. Grabbing this gator by the teeth left some nasty marks in my thumb but I was determined to let this amazing creature live longer. With waves lapping at my chest and neck, I finally felt the fight I was looking for and released my fish. I was soaked from head to toe and cold. It was worth it though. My citation speckled trout has plastic TBar tag number 430630. This is one tag I surely hope to hear about again via recapture.

The amazing speck fishing didn't end there. We caught a total of four more specks that measured 19, 21, 21.5, 22.5 inches. Not a bad haul of specks from the sand. I was lucky to be joined by fellow club member Mike Mueller and his son Matt. I brought 4 pounds of minicob mullet. I define those to be mullet in the 8-10" range. I did invite a lot of people and nearly nobody showed up, which meant more bait for me. In a way it worked out good as I managed to use all the bait up during the day.

No roundhead or big red drum today. In a way it feels like a failed trip. I've only caught one roundhead in Virginia since hurricane Dorian. I tagged two puppies, one black, and 20 specks today. TB 430628-430650. Could have tagged many more if I had brought more tags. Lesson learned.

Surf Fishing Wrightsville Beach 10/31 and 11/1

Crazy good Surf fishing. I'm in Wrightsville Beach for a couple days and couldn't resist the chance to get on the beach. There weren't any sand fleas around, so I was forced to use a variety of fish bites and cut fish.

Yesterday, I was only able to fish for an hour before sunset. I worked a hole after low tide. It was windy, it was cloudy, it was rainy, and it was dark, but I was rewarded with the largest black drum I've ever caught in the surf. I didn't have a measure tape but estimate the length between 18-20". I also caught a pair of roundhead and a pair of bluefish.

Today, I got in on the action about two hours before high tide. Yeah, it was 48 degrees this morning, but the fish don't feel the air. The bite was on all morning and I was consistently doubled and tripled over. Today's species included pinfish, porgy, roundhead, bluefish, pompano, spot, flounder, and pufferfish. I kept a few of the larger ones and released dozens of bluefish and pinfish. The largest bluefish of the day was caught on a small strip of bloodworm fish bites that I was targeting the spot.

I also got some kind of fishing slam by catching a spot, flounder, and bluefish at the same time (as I was reeling in the spot, a bluefish and flounder took another rig.) Later, I caught a big southern ray that I wanted to keep but it was too much work to save. I had a monster run early on the rod the roundhead were focused on and broke the rig as a big wave rolled over another. I could only see the color and identified it as a big roundhead or puppy. Wish I could have beached it.

Looking forward to fishing next weeks Cape Hatteras Anglers Club tournament for the first time this year.







