HUNT FOR THE HARD HEADS MAY 18, 2019

Four teams from the Virginia Beach Angler's Club competed in the 2019 Hunt for the Hard Heads Tournament against the Portsmouth Angler's Club, the Norfolk Angler's Club and the Great Bridge Fisherman's Association. It was a gorgeous day on the water for the teams of three or four anglers. Light winds and calm seas treated the anglers to a great fishing day. Fishing was restricted to the waters west of the Hampton Roads Bridge Tunnel. The targeted species were Croakers, Blue Fish and Flounder. Numerous Croakers and Blue Fish were caught by all teams. The only Flounders caught were by Virginia Beach. However, the two Flounders were under sized and non-scoring fish. The "Measure In" was held at Portsmouth City Park and Portsmouth Angler's Club sponsored lunch for all angler's and guests. Lunch was fried chicken, coleslaw, beans, rolls and assorted drinks. Proceeds from the tournament went to the Wish a Fish organization. The final results were: Great Bridge came in first, Norfolk came in second and Portsmouth and Virginia Beach came in tied for third. Those two Flounders would have really helped.



The recreational cobia season opens this Saturday.

All anglers, captains, and guides fishing for cobia must obtain a Recreational Cobia Permit from the Commission and report all harvest and cobia fishing activity. (Easy to obtain on line - just did it. No cost.)

Recreational cobia regulations are as follows: 40-inch, total length, minimum size limit; 1-fish daily possession limit or 3-fish-daily vessel limit, whichever is more restrictive; only one fish per vessel per day may be greater than 50 inches in total length; an open season of June 1 through September 30; and gaffing is now allowed to land a cobia while fishing recreationally. All anglers, captains, and guides fishing for cobia must obtain a Recreational Cobia Permit from the Commission and report all harvest and cobia fishing activity. Permits can be obtained online here or at an MRC Licensing Agent. Reporting can be done online through the Saltwater Journal or using forms provided by the VMRC.

While most sources of pollution to the Bay are declining, urban and suburban polluted runoff is a significant source of pollution that continues to grow in the Chesapeake watershed. And with climate change continuing to deliver more frequent and intense storms, we must adapt as heavy rains wash more pollutants from the land into our waterways.

To address this onslaught of polluted runoff, we should turn to natural and nature-based solutions and policy. These provide co-benefits of water quality and habitat protection. As Virginia Beach considers future infrastructure, impacts on water quality must be at the forefront.

Went fishing with Brian Tsai on Robert and Mary's boat on the Friday of Memorial Day weekend. It was a little choppy from the north but the forecast was for calmer weather in the evening so we made a go for the 4th island.

Since the fishing is a little ahead of schedule, we anchored up at the 4th to see if any triggers, sheep's, or spades were biting. There was little action except for the sea bass so we didn't fish there for very long. While we were anchored, we saw a Spanish pulled in by a boat trolling back and forth. We put on our trolling spoons and planners and caught a couple of decent blues near the spine. Then worked towards the high rise. There were a number of occasions that the spoons were hit but didn't produce a bite. Everything looked good and the hooks were sharp which made us curious as to why the fish weren't getting the hook.

At about 5:30, we set up on the nautilus shoal. The current was strong but the sea state was nice which made for a beautiful evening and sunset. While setting clams, they weren't lasting long on the bottom so we put down a couple of rigs to tempt whatever was stealing the clams. We found a few sizable Roundhead along with some big rays and sharks lingering. The two rays that were kept made good filets. We drowned the same half dozen live crabs for four hours without a run. At least we know it wasn't the bait. We saw a pair of fish caught by boats anchored nearby so I know there's a few still on the shoals.

At 9:30, we wrapped up our fishing adventure and ran home deep into Lynnhaven at low tide. It would certainly have been easier with a strong flashlight. Lesson learned. I had another great adventure with Mary and Robert and looking forward to teaching them some more fishing techniques this summer.







Offshore Black Sea Bass Trip 5/27/2019 By Kelly Hoggard

I went fishing with Patty Searby and David Anderson on Mark Wallace's boat on Memorial Day 5/27. I saw the good offshore forecast for Monday on the Saturday before and decided to go for the blue water. We checked all the equipment, filled the tank with gas, and off we went at 5:30 am. By 7:30, we were sitting at the triangle reef on the Lillian Luckenbach. There were plenty of fish marks, and quickly dropped a couple of baits. On the first drop, both lines caught fish, one was a bluefish by David but the sea bass were under the 12.5" minimums. After about an hour, we were tired of throwbacks and decided to move a little deeper.

A while later, we hit the blue line tile grounds and made a drop. After about an hour, our rigs went without a bite. The current and wind were moving opposite, which made 16-20oz required to meet bottom with a little help from the engine. I moved us south near the 44 fathom wreck and played around there a while. There were a few marks, but after drifting another 30 minutes in the area, we struck out. Another 40 minutes passed and we had moved 15 Nautical Miles north to the north side of the canyon. Again, no marks and no bites on the drift. We decided to pack it up, and start our way back home.

A few drops at the Ocean Venture yielded a few sea bass. After our second drift, we got a visit from a sunfish. As we turned the boat to watch him, it was as if we were in a watery dance together doing curious circles around each other. There were signs that another boater had been there before us as a freshly dead seabass was seen floating on the surface. We also stopped at the John Morgan on the way back yielding some more Black Sea Bass for the box. Nothing of great size and still a lot of throwbacks. Patty hooked a nice 13" pinfish that weighed in just 1 oz shy of the club record. After 3 of our 4 rigs were lost on the same drift at the Morgan, we decided that was a sign to head in. Mark is pictured at the dock with his largest "knothead" of the day that he caught at the Morgan. The fishing queen of the day was certainly Patty, as she caught nearly half of all our fish.

I managed to tag and release 8 fat sea bass that were all 11-12" with tag numbers TB417913-TB417920. Don't forget to bring a seaqualizer with you anytime you're fishing deep water wrecks to help compress the fish and release them at depth.

The ride was smooth nearly all day except for a bit of a cross swell on the way out in the morning. Mark certainly learned about the capabilities of his boat on this adventurous day. We are looking forward to going fishing again when the cobia season fires up next weekend.

Went fishing on Friday 5/31 with Virginia Beach Anglers Club member Robert. It was an amazing day out along the ocean front. We trolled from Cape Henry down to the Cavalier and caught Spanish up to 17" on Billy's "Bowed Up Lures" spoons. The rain made it a little tough to work the dark water, but the pink and white was really productive in all conditions. We worked our way out to the light tower in the slick calm conditions. I got hooked up on the first cast for spadefish with the largest fish just shy of 6 pounds. I spent a little time chatting with nearby boats and divers and got lucky when one of the divers offered to retrieve my lost cork after one of many broken lines. After catching our limit, we caught a few more looking for that elusive monster but weren't able to find them. Those extra 3-5 pounders were tagged and released for another day. The last spadefish we caught was gill hooked, so I pulled one of our larger fish to share with a nearby Sea Tow member I recognized. We also caught a flounder and a few sea bass at the tower reef, but they were all shorts and were tagged and released for another fisherman's bounty. Today's tags: TB417921 - TB417930. Lots of fresh fish for the dinner table.

Went over to the eastern shore with my kayak May 9th got to my buddy's place island after sun down targeting reds and blacks. The wind was blowing that night not much fishing. Woke up around 5ready to fish. I've had some tackle issues on the island before so I rigged up with 75 pound braid, I was ready. First cast took about 30 seconds till I got slammed drag pulling, reel screaming fun. It took a lot of line but I wasn't worried because I had plenty, or I thought I had plenty. He stopped and I gave him a tug, he said no sir and proceeded to take every bit of line of my reel. I wasn't happy. I saw that fish breech a couple of times and now I had no line. Went into the house and found some 15 pound test and rigged up again not that confident to say the least. Went back down to fish and immediately was rewarded with three nice blacks, didn't have a cooler so I let them swim away, then the reds came back. I got three reds to the bank and released all of them that morning. Tide was almost so I chilled till that evening my buddy got there and we went to fishing again we landed 17 reds that weekend and we didn't count the blacks, or we don't remember may have been some whiskey on the island. This was my first black ever!

Chef's Corner: Shrimp Imperial-Stuffed Spanish Mackerel and Bluefish Fillets

JUNE 2019

When the Bite Heats up this Spring, try this Variation of the Classic Dish that put our Family Restaurant on the Map in 1976!

One of my favorite ways to enjoy a nice thick fillet is broiled with an Imperial Stuffing made form one or more of the following: Fresh-picked Blue Crab; Fresh NC Shrimp; or Fresh-shucked Oysters, Clams, & Scallops.

Pictured below is a meal I concocted at our Salvo cottage: Fresh Garden-ripe Tomato Salad, Hand-cut Fried Potatoes; and an absolutely amazing 14-ounce Shrimp-Stuffed Spanish Mackerel Fillet, which is this month's featured dish!



Shrimp-Stuffed Spanish Mackerel with all the trimmings – this is by far my favorite recipe for broiling fresh fish!

With the price of fresh, quality crabmeat skyrocketing, this recipe focuses on utilizing something most OBX surf anglers have left in their cooler after a day or two of fishing – fresh "bait" shrimp!

I like to use FRESH bait when I fish – as in fresh enough for me to eat! Bait shrimp is food shrimp portioned-out for anglers, but it is no different than the "good stuff" you find in the local seafood shop or roadside stand.

On this particular angling excursion, I left the fresh bait on ice in the cooler and opted for my "metal rod" and favorite Stingsilver to cast – and catch – a nice mess of Spanish Mackerel and Bluefish.

A successful catch of both meant that my "bait shrimp" was now on the menu!

Classic May Catch throwing metal in the OBX Surf!

Below are the ingredients and basic process for preparing the Fish for the broiler and mixing the Imperial stuffing. The two Bluefish yielded four really nice "Stuffable" fillets that I broiled with the leftover Shrimp Imperial from this recipe.

I like to cook extra like that because it heats up so well for a quick lunch or breakfast, and it's also excellent eaten cold right out of the fridge for a late-night snack. It really is that good, and I hope you get a chance to try it this summer!

Ingredients:

While the ingredients can vary, and I often tweak the recipe with whatever ingredients I have on hand, this basic recipe is very simple and easy to replicate time and again with great results.

Preparing the Fish:

1-2 pounds fresh Bluefish or Spanish Mackerel fillets (8-10 oz each, but smaller will work – just get more of them!)

1/4 cup melted butter or olive oil to baste fillets

Seasoning of choice for the flesh of the fish (i.e. salt, pepper, oregano, garlic, and paprika – or simply use Old Bay, Lemon Pepper, or Cajun Shake)

½ Lemon (for squeezing over fish and deglazing the pan)

Dash of Dry Sherry (optional)

NOTE: This recipe works fine with virtually any FRESH fillets, including Kingfish, Flounder, Mahi, and Sea Trout.

Shrimp Imperial:

%-pound fresh NC shrimp, cooked (up to a pound works!)

2 eggs

½-cup extra heavy mayonnaise (more if regular mayo)

- 1 tablespoon Worcestershire Sauce
- 2 teaspoons Tabasco (to taste, really I like a kick)
- 1 tablespoon parsley flakes (can use fresh parsley, also)
- 1 tablespoon plain breadcrumbs
- 1 tablespoon finely diced onion (optional)
- 2 tablespoons of finely shredded cheddar (sharp or mild) more if you like it cheesy!
- 1 teaspoon Old Bay Seasoning or Cajun Shake

Directions:

Shrimp Imperial:

Gently steam the shrimp and immediately shock in ice to shill. Once chilled, peel and drain the shrimp.

Once shrimp are cold, pat dry on paper towel and chop the shrimp and add to a large mixing bowl.

Combine shrimp, eggs, and all other ingredients in bowl and mix by hand until well-combined.

The mixture should have a creamy texture with no visible liquid or juices.

Return to the fridge and let the Shrimp Imperial "set."

Stuffing the Fillets:

Make two slits longitudinally into the middle of the fillet on either side of the centerline.

Be careful not to cut straight down and through – the cut should create a nice long pouch from top to bottom in which the stuffing is placed.

Baste each stuffed fillet with oil and broil on the high rack on high until the Imperial begins to brown. Remove from the broiler, baste each fillet, and season the fish with your choice of seasonings. Lightly dust the entire fillet with paprika and return to the oven on a lower rack and bake (or leave broiler on) until the imperial is just firm to the touch.

When done, remove from oven, kill the sizzle with a dash of dry sherry, and squeeze fresh lemon juice around the fish to deglaze the pan and create a wonderful sauce. I like using a little dry sherry as I deglaze the pan, but it is entirely optional.

Drizzle the lemon-butter sauce from the pan over the fillets and serve!

VBAC Surf Fishing Teams Post Another Strong Performance at OISFT, Ocracoke, NC.



Ocracoke and Hatteras Islands are Producing Great Catches!

The spring bite has really turned on from Ocracoke to the Northern OBX Beaches!

Here's a firsthand report of fishing conditions across Hatteras Island for 16 April through 25 May 2019.

Fishing the OBX surf in the late spring is one of the best opportunities to catch some really nice fish! The larger, more powerful fish of virtually all species are able to migrate up the coast first, so this is truly the time of year to hunt citations!

Late April through mid-May saw the Sea Mullet, Puffer, Bluefish, and Red Drum bite turn on from Ocracoke to beaches as far north as Kitty Hawk.

As water temps rose, Pompano, Cobia, and Spanish Mackerel started showing up in really good numbers.

Here's a firsthand summary of what we saw:

APRIL 25th: VBAC angler John Germanos fished the Frisco beaches with excellent catches of large Sea Mullet, Bluefish, Grunts, Bluefish, Croakers, and Puffers!

APRIL 27th: VBAC anglers John Germanos and Bob Schuster took a break from fishing to "practice" for the VBAC Annual

Oyster Roast and talk strategies for the 2019 Little Island Spring Open which Bob won with a pair of nice Bluefish!

APRIL 28th: Red drum bite starting to turn on at Cape Point with several citations for the "Bombers." Most of the better fish required a long cast beyond the second bar (150 yards). Lots of sharks still hitting Fishfinder rigs with various cut bait offerings. Some really nice Sea Mullet south of the Point along with puffers and scattered blues.

APRIL 30th: VBAC angler John Germanos pre-fished Ramp 70 in Ocracoke in the afternoon. Several tournament rigs were tested with various combinations of baits and presentations. Once dialed-in, John put 8 quality Bluefish in the cooler ranging from 13 inches to 20 inches and two Sea Mullet over 14 inches made the grade. Hot baits included fresh cut mullet, shrimp, and bloodworms. All

successful rigs were hand-tied and customized to prepare for the OISFT.

MAY 1st: VBAC angler John Germanos pre-fished the sunrise at Ramp 72 in Ocracoke with more success, putting another 7 quality 14+ inch bluefish in the cooler along with a 41-inch Spiny Dogfish. Back in Buxton, the first report of Cobia in the surf – fresh bunker was the hot bait.

MAY 2nd: Day 1 of the Ocracoke Invitational Surf Fishing Tournament (OISFT). Team 1 got off to a slow start, while Team 2 ended the day in 13th Place. Bluefish and Sea Mullet scored most of the points.

MAY 3rd: Day 2 of the OISFT. Team 1 put in a solid performance and climbed up to 22nd place while Team 2 remained consistent, finishing in 14th place overall and one fish outside the Top 6! Bluefish ruled the day with some scattered Sea Mullet.

MAY 4th: VBAC anglers Kelly Hoggard and Doug Wehner had one last hoorah in Ocracoke fishing Ramp 59, and Patty Searby and Carl McCoy did some catching of their own before heading north! Great catches of near-citation Sea Mullet and more quality Bluefish made for some great catching and a fitting end to a great week on the Island!

MAY 5th: VBAC anglers John Germanos and Kelly Hoggard tried their luck at Ramp 32 with Salvo neighbor Jeff. The trio put a few respectable fish in the cooler for dinner, including three nice Sea Mullet and keeper Grey Trout. Live sand fleas and EZ-Flea Fish Bites were the preferred baits, but the session was cut short to save the gear from the blowing sand!

MAY 6th: National Park Service closed Ramp 44 access to Cape Point due to observed nesting activity. VBAC angler John Germanos took another "0-fer" on the Salvo Beach with extremely strong rip currents that made 10-oz storm sinkers tumble down the beach at a pretty fast clip.

MAY 7th: VBAC angler John Germanos fished the northern beaches again with only slightly better results, putting three fish in the cooler, highlighted by another 18-inch Bluefish.

MAY 10th: Spanish Mackerel showed up at Ramp 43 with several folks catching their limit. More citation Sea Mullet were caught as well!

MAY 11th: VBAC Angler John Germanos participated in the Cape Hatteras Angler's Club (CHAC) meeting in Buxton, NC. The guest speaker was World-class Surf-Casting Champion Tommy Farmer. Tommy provided an excellent tutorial and live demonstration of the power-casting technique that has earned him international acclaim in the U.S. and across Europe. VBAC connections were reinforced, and our exposure continues to grow within the CHAC and across OBX. Worthy of **Note**: CHAC finished 32nd in the 2019 Ocracoke Invitational Surf Fishing Tournament (OISFT) while our two VBAC Teams finished 14th and 22nd. VBAC will enter 2 Teams in the 2019 CHAC Tournament.

MAY 12th through MAY 23rd: My contacts in OBX reported a steady stream of citation Pompano, Sea Mullet, and Red Drum being caught from Salvo to Hatteras Village. Bluefish continued to make their presence known, and Spanish Mackerel began making a progressively stronger run as water temperatures continued to rise. Similarly, the Cobia bite in the surf really started picking up. I was back in VaBch for the Little Island Spring Open but will return to OBX ASAP!

Following the Little Island Spring Open, I will return to fish the OBX Surf deep into May and June to prepare for the VBAC Salvo Spring Open, but this captures my account through 23 May and highlights some of the species common to NC's coastal waters during the late spring.

The big Red Drum started showing up in force, as did Cobia and Spanish Mackerel. Excellent catches of citation Sea Mullet and Pompano continue to make headlines, and a steady Bluefish bite continues to entertain all! Overall, the fishing in the OBX surf has been dynamite for the past six weeks!

Fish were caught in the wash, in narrow sloughs, on the sandbar ledges, and beyond the second bar depending on the weather conditions, rip, and water clarity. Some of the nicer fish seemed to be farther out, but many of the citation Pompano and Sea Mullet were caught within 40 yards of the waterline!

As I like to say, you can't catch fish by sitting on the couch – get a line in the water and have some fun!

The preferred baits were fresh cut mullet; shrimp; bloodworms; squid strips; and sand fleas. Cobia seemed to really like fresh cut bunker presented on a Fishfinder rig. Red and White tournament rigs were very productive, as were Fireball Rigs, and various custom-tied Hi-Lo Rigs.

Spanish Mackerel and Bluefish were starting to hit various metal baits as more baitfish showed up in schools. Various colors and types caught fish, especially The Ghost Glass Minnow, copper Stingsilver, and several other Stingsilver and Glass Minnow color combinations.

Remember, when throwing metal, if you want to catch more Spanish and less Blues, retrieve FAST!

Sandbridge Surf Fishing 5/11/19:

Went surf fishing today with VBAC members Patty Searby, Bob Stuhlman, Rob Stommel, and Wesley Waters. It was a beautiful morning with some clouds but light winds and cool temperatures. The water is still cool, low 60s it felt like. The day started off pretty miserable with no cure for the seaweed at low tide. There was no fishable water but I kept throwing baits waiting for the bite. After the tide turned, the water cleared and the fish began to bite.

My patience paid off as I caught another personal best. It began with a strong bite followed by a battle to the beach. What swam up in one of the waves was a new personal best Striped Bass from the surf. It's only my second but much larger than the first (last May also). The striper measured out at 25". Mixed in was a croaker and 5 roundhead. The roundhead were good size and ranged up to 13". The bite had just turned on as I left but was happy to get in some quality fishing time.

Today's main goal was to pre-fish the upcoming VBAC members surf fishing tournament in sandbridge next Saturday (5/18). I got some good intel for anglers who plan to participate. Unfortunately, I am scheduled to be busy and will not attend. Lucky for those who fish of course. My 3.5 hour session would have tallied 90 points if a score was kept. It's a good number for anyone who is fishing next week to try and target. Good intel: the sand fleas have really been on fire this year.

The rigs I've been making have really been catching fish and each time I go out, I learn more about the rigs successes or failures. They are really starting to catch quality fish.

Looking forward to another day out in the surf and sand again soon.

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





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VBAC MISSION STATEMENT
