- -Lines in at 7 am sharp
- -Please try and be a little early to set up and sign in
- -Water and light snacks will be available
- -You may fish no more than 2 poles
- -Please bring a bucket to keep your fish waiting to be scored (I will have a few if you don't have one)

Remember the points earned in this tournament go toward your yearly intra-club qualifier total. The top 3 total points scorers for the year will have the opportunity to choose a spot on a team in a tournament of their choosing in 2021.

#### **TOURNAMENT RULES AND GUIDELINES**

Anglers are responsible for:

- Providing all equipment, bait, and tackle required to participate in the event.
- -Having all appropriate licenses and observing/knowing all applicable fishing

regulations, size limits, and published VBAC rules.

- -At no time shall any angler have more than two lines in the water.
- -Float rigs, balloons, plastic bags, etc. will not be allowed. No cast nets may be used during a fishing session.
- -Chumming or chum pots at any time are not permitted. Anglers doing so will be disqualified.
- -Not more than two hooks are allowed on one line at any time with the exception of two double hooked rigs, and artificial lures with hooks according to manufacturer's specifications.
- -All tournament fish must be caught on hook or lure and landed on the beach by the angler.
- -No lines are permitted to be in the water prior to starting time. All lines must be reeled in at the stopping time.
- -Any fish hooked prior to end of the session will be scored when landed.
- -It is the angler's responsibility to fish within the established boundaries of the designated fishing area.
- -All fish shall be measured from the tip of the snout to the compressed tip of the tail once it has been determined the fish meets the minimum legal-size limit. Largest fish is determined by length to the nearest quarter inch.
- -If an angler chooses to keep a legal fish, that fish must have its tail clipped by one of the judges.
- -Any angler with questionable fish as determined by the Chief Judge, will be disqualified from the competition.
- -In the event that an angler is unable to physically cast for themselves, a designated casting person must be identified before fishing begins.
- -The event winner is determined by total points scored. First tiebreaker is total number of fish caught. Second tiebreaker is largest fish caught. If still tied, a winner will be determined by the flip of a coin by the Chief Judge.

#### **SCORING**

#### NOTE: Anglers MUST review all 2020 State Recreational angling and Tournament Rules PRIOR to fishing!

Each angler may enter fish IAW eligible species and minimum size requirements listed below. Fish must also meet minimum **legal**-size limits to score.

Except for "Trash Fish," points are recorded based on **total length** of each scorable fish as measured from tip of snout to pinched down tail. All "Trash Fish" shall be recorded as "One Inch" and scored as one point per fish.

**Examples**: A 14-inch Bluefish scores 14 points. An 8-inch Croaker scores 8 points. A 6-inch Spot is not scorable. A stingray scores 1 point (regardless of size). A 17-inch Red Drum is **not** scorable. A 48-inch Shark scores 1 point.

#### U.S. Coast Guard releases 2019 Recreational Boating Statistics Report

#### Alcohol was the leading factor in more than 100 deaths last year

WASHINGTON — The U.S. Coast Guard has released its 2019 Recreational Boating Statistics Report, revealing that there were 613 boating fatalities nationwide in 2019, a 3.2 percent decrease from 2018.

From 2018 to 2019, the total number of accidents increased 0.6 percent (4,145 to 4,168), and the number of non-fatal injured victims increased 1.9 percent (2,511 to 2,559).

Alcohol continued to be the leading known contributing factor in fatal boating accidents in 2019, accounting for over 100 deaths, or 23 percent of total fatalities.

The report also shows that in 2019:

- The fatality rate was 5.2 deaths per 100,000 registered recreational vessels, which tied as the second lowest rate in the program's history. This rate represents a 1.9 percent decrease from last year's fatality rate of 5.3 deaths per 100,000 registered recreational vessels.
- Property damage totaled about \$55 million.
- Operator inattention, improper lookout, operator inexperience, excessive speed, and alcohol use ranked as the top five primary contributing factors in accidents.

Where the cause of death was known, 79 percent of fatal boating accident victims drowned. Of those drowning victims with reported life jacket usage, 86 percent were not wearing a life jacket.

Capt. Scott Johnson, chief of the Office of Auxiliary and Boating Safety at Coast Guard Headquarters, cited one case in November, in which a party of eight in Indiana attempted to cross the White River in a 14-ft boat. Overloaded, it capsized sending occupants into the water. Five perished from drowning as a result, including a 6-year old child. None of the victims were wearing a life jacket.

"It's critical for boaters to wear a life jacket at all times because it very likely will save your life. Ensure that it is serviceable, properly sized, and correctly worn." Johnson noted that sometimes victims had not fastened their life jacket properly, or had not replaced the expired cartridge in their inflatable life jacket. In one case, the cartridge had been modified, making it ineffective as a lifesaving device.

Where boating instruction was known, 70 percent of deaths occurred on vessels where the operator had not received boating safety instruction. The Coast Guard recommends that all boaters take a boating safety course that meets the National Boating Education Standards prior to getting out on the water.

The most common vessel types involved in reported accidents were open motorboats, personal watercraft, and cabin motorboats. Where vessel type was known, the vessel types with the highest percentage of deaths were open motorboats (48 percent), kayaks (14 percent), and personal watercraft (8 percent).

The Coast Guard reminds all boaters to boat responsibly on the water: wear a life jacket, take a boating safety course, attach the engine cut-off switch, get a free vessel safety check, and boat sober.

"We praise our boating safety partners," said Johnson. "Together we strive to reduce loss of life, injuries and property damage by increasing the knowledge and skill of recreational boaters."

"A new meteorological buoy was deployed just above the Triple Zeros (~41033) in 16 fathoms east of Kitty Hawk on June 7 to collect wind and environmental data. Real-time sea state and wind data are now available to the fishing fleet. All of the fisheries information for the Kitty Hawk Offshore wind project, including the latest fisheries notices, notices to mariners, Fisheries FAQs, and the buoy data dashboard are available online at <a href="https://kittyhawkoffshore.com/fishing">kittyhawkoffshore.com/fishing</a>

The M/V GERRY BORDELON will continue conducting high resolution bathymetric and geophysical survey operations in the Kitty Hawk lease area and corridor through 2020. Additionally, the R/V KOMMANDOR SUSAN will conduct geotechnical surveys and sampling in the Kitty Hawk project area and corridor from July through August of 2020. Please find the attached fisheries notice providing additional information on the survey operations and meteorological buoy deployment.

## Chef's Corner: Pan-Fried Fish Roe Poppers

**JULY 2020** 

This nutrition-packed Fish Roe recipe is quick, easy, and makes a great appetizer, snack, or meal any time of the day or night!



Fresh Pan-Fried Sea Mullet Roe with Lemon and Tabasco!

Waste not, want not continues to be my theme as I explore the ethical utilization of all edible morsels from our catch or harvest. Roe is no exception and is an ethereal "Super Food" packed with protein, essential fats, vitamins, and minerals.

Fish Roe is an excellent source of Omega-3 Fatty Acids and at between 120-170 Calories per 3-ounce serving, it packs a powerful nutritional punch and substantial value based on recommended daily allowances:

•	Vitamin B-12:	142%
•	Vitamin D:	103%
•	Protein:	38%
•	Vitamin C:	23%
•	Vitamin B-6:	5%

•	Vitamin A:	5%
•	Potassium:	5%
•	Magnesium:	49
•	Iron:	3%
•	Calcium:	2%

If that's not enough incentive to salvage and prepare this delectable "by product" of our catch, fresh Roe is also rich, piquant, and savory for those that make the effort to explore its culinary diversity!

Roe is also high in cholesterol, but its nutritional profile offers potential benefits for cholesterol levels. All but 1.5 g of the 7 g of fat in each 3-oz. serving is unsaturated, rather than saturated or trans-fat, which are unhealthy fats. This is fantastic given its massive nutritional benefits, so let's explore this Super Food candidate in more detail!

In our restaurant years, my father always ordered fresh fish "on-the-hoof" to ensure we got the most value per pound during the processing stages while

ensuring our patrons received only the freshest catch available, and I was the "lucky" processor!

Whether it was large Grey Trout, Flounder, Mahi, and Striped Bass, or Panfish such as Pompano, Spots, Croakers, and Kingfish, I saved the Roe from every fish I cleaned or filleted. These small delicacies became family meals back in the day, and for our most learned customers, we served "off the board" specials of fried Roe a la carte or as an addition to our many fried and broiled seafood platter combos. They would simply ask their server for "a side of roe," and it was so!

To this day, I save even the smallest sets of Roe pulled from Kingfish, Spanish Mackerel, Bluefish, Spots, Croakers, and Smooth Puffers as they find their way into my cooler each spring. The picture above right, for example, includes small sets of Roe pulled from a day's catch of Blues, Kingfish, Spanish, and a Puffer.

What a GREAT appetizer!!

Virtually all fish are full of Roe in the spring and early summer, but most foks simply don't want to use it.

Unfortunately, they discard the Roe with the carcasses, typically because they are unfamiliar with anything but Shad Roe.

They truly do not know what they are missing, so hopefully, this article will trigger an enlightenment that propels this up the list of must-have Super Foods!

Whether it is big or small, bright red or pale yellow, fish Roe is a culinary gift of spring and a nutritional power-pack.

So have an open mind, and "Just Say Yes" the next time you're asked if you want to keep that Roe.

Now, on with this month's featured recipe!

Fried Fish Roe Poppers

Pictured at right is my 2020 citation Sea Mullet which produced a 2-ounce set of Roe for the skillet. It weighed-in at 1 lb 9 oz, so that saturated 2-oz Roe sack literally qualified it as a citation! No way was I wasting that succulent set of Roe!

#### **Ingredients:**

- \*12 or more sets of fresh Sea Mullet Roe (other types of roe work too!)
- 1 cup House Autry's Seafood Breading (or your favorite breading!)
- 1 egg, beaten

¼-cup milk

2-4 tablespoons of oil (bacon grease, olive oil, butter, canola, etc. - can also use a deep-fat fryer if preferred)

Fresh lemon, halved

Tabasco sauce (optional)

\*NOTE: I used 2 dozen sets of Sea Mullet roe in this instance, but virtually any roe is excellent, including Sea Trout, Spanish Mackerel, Southern Puffers, Bluefish, Spot, Sand Perch, Croaker, etc. Roe from freshwater panfish is excellent, too.

#### **Directions:**

#### Step 1: Carefully remove the Roe as you fillet the fish!

Whatever Roe you do not plan to use right away should be par-frozen to maintain its shape, then vacuum-sealed for the freezer. It maintains its shape and freezes well when processed this way to ensure it can be enjoyed all summer!

#### Step 2: Prepare the Roe for the Fryer!

Lightly coat each set of Roe in the breading mix.

Combine the egg and milk in a small bowl and beat into an egg wash.

Dip the Row in the egg wash and return to the breading for a heartier coating.

Use a toothpick to perforate each egg sack with 2 or 3 "vents" per sack (helps prevent it from popping in the skillet)

#### Step 3: Pan-frying the Roe!

Heat oil to at least 375 degrees in your favorite pan-frying skillet (or deep-fat fryer). You want it hot for a quick sere.

Add the Roe and fry until golden on each side but be careful not overcook it – it's best when the moisture is retained!

Remove the Roe Poppers onto paper towel and serve with lemon and Tabasco!

#### Tips:

- Perforating the roe sacks with a toothpick helps avoid excessive splatter
- Use a splatter screen over the skillet just in case
- Add the largest sets of roe to the skillet first since they take longer to cook

#### Additional Ways to Enjoy Fresh or Prepared Fish Roe

I have replicated the above recipe with some variations for years, and it works for all kinds of Roe and ranging in size from less than an ounce to 5 or 6 ounces. But there are so many other ways to enjoy small <u>or</u> large sets of Roe, I had to list a few here – some of which may appear in future editions of the Chef's Corner!

Here's a list of more great dishes which feature this magnificent Super Food:

- Striped Bass Roe with Fresh Herbs
- Pan-Fried Mahi Roe
- Fish Egg Fritters
- Baked Whole Shad with Roe (an old-time Maryland tradition!)
- Fried Bluegill Eggs
- Spicy Fried Fish Egg Masala
- Fish Egg Fritters Curry
- Fish Eggs Benedict
- Taramasalata I would shame my heritage if I didn't list this Grecian masterpiece!

These are but a few of the recipes I have discovered and tried, and all are exceptional. The list indeed goes on!

The imagination is the limit, and as you learn how to master the art of preparing fresh Roe, you will come to appreciate all of the subtle nuances of each species-derived set – the textures and flavors will take you away to generations past when these delicacies provided crucial nutrition and were revered vice discarded to waste away with the carcasses.



#### Blind Date Deep Drop - by Kelly Hoggard

#### An Epic Deep Sea Adventure!

For my yearly trip with Captain Stan Gold on Blind Date Charters, I invited Bryan Watkins and Dave Anderson to accompany me. There was also a last minute edition of Ike Eisenhower to join the party. Together, the five of us left the dock shortly after 5 in the morning on June 25<sup>th</sup>. The seas were calm, the sunrise was beautifully red and orange, and the fishing was amazing. We received a sprinkle or two throughout the day, but almost no rain fell as was forecasted. Winds were light and less than 5 mph the entire trip.

Stan primarily charters as a deep drop captain, so his equipment and rigs are always on point. But with the calm seas and slow drift, I knew I had an opportunity to put my new Seigler SGN to work with the 168g jigging rod I bought for it. I knew if it could handle some nice togs, then bottom fishing for small to medium sized fish would be very doable. We started fishing for blueline tilefish. The bite was not very hot to start. Ike was the first to hook up, and myself shortly after. We boated the fish and without bites, moved a short distance away where a rip indicated a little more current. Even in this heavier current, our drift was barely .4 kts. Ike was quickly rewarded with one of the best catches of the day! A 12 lb 6 oz blueline tilefish came over the side.

We slowly picked through the scattered fish and then found some nicer bites closer to where we began fishing initially. I hooked up on citation blueline Tilefish that fought hard and pulled quite a lot of drag. The first weighed in at 12 lb 4 oz. Shortly after, Bryan had nice bites and hooked up to a tile. Dave was noticing that his rig was being affected by the fish and he continued to reel to keep up with Bryan so the extra line wouldn't tangle. When the fish made it to the boat, captain Stan pulled the fish over the side. To our surprise! The fish was hooked on the top hook of both rigs! My second citation came on the last drift and was nearly the last fish to reach our limit. It weighed a hefty 13 lb. I was ecstatic to finally get that citation blueline I had been craving for many years. It was a quick hour and a half to get the bluelines.

Stan moved us to a new location to target some golden tilefish. This area ranged around 500-800 feet of water. As we were rigging up, it was apparent that we had the right crew on board. Everyone was craving that opportunity to hand crank that big golden. That's right, no electric reels for this crew! We dropped initially with no bites. It was obvious now how miserable hand cranking could be, but it would be worth it when the bite would come to us. We moved a short distance away. A shark surfaced nearby and as it did, lke and I almost immediately had the first bites. I gave it a little tug and knew I was hooked up! I cranked and cranked and cranked until that golden came up to the side of the boat and I slung him over. My first golden tilefish! Dave was second to get a hookup and he reeled his beautiful golden in. I hooked a fish at about the same time, but Dave was certainly getting his up faster, mine was taking drag to go back to the bottom! After a long fight, the golden came over the side and it weighed in at 18 lb. The bite was a little slow after. We picked around at the tilefish grounds and got one or two fish per drift.


Bryan later got a sizeable golden to add to his fishing career. On one of the other drifts; Dave, Bryan, and myself were all hooked up to a golden tilefish. As Dave was fighting, we noticed the line go slack. Sadly, it appeared a shark got the better of one of our fish for the day and broke the rig. It looked like a nice fish with such a strong fight. After we caught our fish, we reset our drift. I was the first to get a bite on the next drift. It was a very heavy fish and fought much more aggressively than I expected. I was getting pretty tired of pulling all this weight. The fight must have lasted about 20 minutes. When we finally got eyes on the fish, I was surprised that it was only around 10 pounds. But as we pulled the fish up, we noticed a green power pro line tangled in my rig. Well, there weren't any rods out with green power pro, so we got started on pulling, and pulling, and pulling... and suddenly, here it comes! Dave's rig with his lost tilefish comes right to the surface! We sling it in the boat and it's a two for one with a recovered rig. There must have been a couple hundred feet of handline to get that fish in. I suppose Stan gets partial credit for getting it the rest of the way up. At this point, we now had two incredible stories for the day.
