The Hatteras Village Invitational Tournament is run by the Hatteras Village Civic Association. It occurs during the peak of hurricane season and usually fishes ramp 55. There has been little accessible beach on Ramp 55 in the past few years, so the tournament has generally fished ramps 48 and 49. This tournament occurs early in the fall. Usually, the fall run is just beginning on Labor Day. In 2022, the excessive warm and calm weather has delayed the fall run until well after the start of the tournament. Anglers faced tough conditions from offshore swells and very few scorable fish in the surf. Spanish and bluefish were scarce on the beaches and the roundhead or pompano were both exceptionally small. Kelly Hoggard led Team A with a 25" puppy drum. The 25 point fish was an amazing catch and propelled the team to a tie for second place. They finished just 1 point behind first and were in possession of the tie breaker. Proof that every point counts when you're out on the beach. With the top 3 finish, all anglers from Team A will return to the 2023 tournament. Team B was not as lucky and scored just 1 bluefish for 3 points. It was tough sledding for nearly every team and angler out on the beaches. We look forward to returning in 2023 in pursuit of that elusive victory!

Team A Report:

The team gathered on Thursday evening for dinner at the lodge. Each member shared their days fishing experiences and prepped for the tournament. It was a little tough to decide how to approach the fishing conditions and what to fish for. It appeared that there were very few scorable fish. The exceptional spanish bite of weeks past did not appear to be possible. Dirty water was likely going to keep them well off the beach and out of range for anglers. It was decided that bottom fishing was the most likely opportunity to score points.

At the tournament registration, the tournament sites were drawn by digital random number wheels. Team A would fish site 17 on Friday morning and site 33 in the afternoon. Friday morning featured a good looking area just west on ramp 49. We pulled up with high hopes of scoring points in the early morning high tide. Fishing for roundhead and blues provided nearly no results. Only a couple of quality fish were caught and a 1 point croaker was scored by Rick Hoggard near the end of the session. He lost a good fish earlier in the session that likely would have provided additional points, which would have been useful later. We retreated to our lodge for lunch with hopes of a more fruitful afternoon.

Friday afternoon was fished about half way between ramp 48 and 49. We were met with low tide at the start of the session. The water was dirty and shallow. It was apparent that scoring was difficult for every team and we were going to have to work hard for every fish we could catch. The water began to rise later in the session providing a better trough for fish to feed in. Kelly got a good bite and managed to score a point on an 11 inch bluefish. Two fish for two points did not seem like much but it was still good enough to be in the top half of the field after day one.

On Saturday morning, conditions appeared to improve slightly as the waves and surge had subsided a little. Team A fished site 51 just a couple hundred yards east of Ramp 48. There was a deep hole at high tide over the breakers and wash. But the 80+ yards of casting distance required to reach it was very problematic for most anglers. Kelly was able to take advantage and land in the trough. He found numerous smaller fish like Jack Crevelle, but did not get the hits he was looking for. Switching over to a doodle bug rig and was immediately rewarded with a scorable bluefish that pulled off in the wash. Kelly threw it back out there and was hooked up shortly after with a strong fighter. At first it was believed to be a nice bluefish. But after riding the fish up on a wave, a nice sized puppy drum came up. One important note about the rules in the tournament was that there were no Over-Slot scoring drum allowed in the tournament this year. So Kelly quickly measured his drum, confirmed it was good to keep, and immediately notified the judge. His 25" puppy drum netted 25 points! There was no time to waste however. The team was in position to finish well and they kept working. Melanie and Micki both scored a nice roundhead for 2 points during the middle of the session. Kelly finished the session off with a 1 point bluefish. The 4 fish for 31 points in session three totaled more points than 1st place had accumulated after day 1. We knew it was an opportunity not to mess around with. The last session was going to be very close and we needed every point we could get.

By chance, we happened to draw site 17 twice during registration and would fish it in the fourth session along with the first. Our advantage was knowing this spot a little bit from the day before. This prior knowledge would prove to be meaningless. There was almost nothing available to catch. No matter the quality of the baits, we could not get a good bite. Kelly again pulled in our only scoring point for the session, an 11.5 inch bluefish that netted 1 additional point. We knew we had a chance, but it was unlikely to provide that winning opportunity we hoped for.

We found out we finished tied for second place upon arriving for the awards ceremony. Our team lost the tie breaker to the other 2nd place team and were officially placed in 3rd. 1st place had finished just one point ahead of us with a total of 35 points. Our team effort finished with 7 fish for 34 points. Our awards included the 3rd place finish, the 3rd session winners, and Kelly took home the award for the largest (other) scoring fish in the tournament; a red drum. Congratulations to our Team A and the amazing effort they put in! They nearly won the tournament and provided memories for club members to share for many years.

Team B Report:

Team B consisted of Captain Carl McCoy, Doug Wehner, Patty Searby, Bill Searby, Vic Muron and Mark Boettcher. We arrived at our team house on Empire Gem Lane in Hatteras Village at various times during the week of the tournament. Empire Gem Lane, incidentally, is named after one of the first ships sunk off the Outer Banks by German U-Boats in World War II. The sinking was accomplished by U-66 in January of 1942. With a north-easterly to easterly wind sweeping the beach between Buxton and Hatteras, fishing was slow prior to, and during, the event.

Team B struggled throughout the first 3 sessions of the tournament, and the 4th session wasn't much better. We'd caught a few small fish and dragged many horseshoe crab shells and reeds onto the beach. Then, having been skunked up to that point, Bill Searby scored a 13 inch bluefish worth 3 points, just before the horn sounded ending the event. Whew!! At least we were on the board, finishing 34th out of 53 teams. The moral of the story is to never quit early, no matter how bad conditions may be. After 11 hours and 58 minutes of fishing, our sole score came with less than 2 minutes to go.

Overall, there weren't many fish taken during the tournament and only one or 2 teams scored many points in each session. The winning team ended up with just 35 points! All 6 of our anglers fished hard, however. Just (bad)luck of the draw, and not many fish.



Fall Favorite: Trout

From the mid Atlantic south down the coast all through the Gulf of Mexico there is a popular fish that anglers love to target. Call them what you will Specks, Sea Trout, yellow mouths or just specked trout are an excellent fish to target that can be caught by using either bait or artificial lures. Specks aren't really a trout at all like the fresh water version but they are in the drum family and have several of the same feeding characteristics as their cousins the red drum. For me the most fun and challenging way to catch them is on artificial lures. The following is just a few of my favorite and several other methods and lures will work just as well.

Trout are more of an "up" feeder meaning they don't root on the bottom, instead ambush prey by looking up from their hiding spots. So I'm looking for structure like oyster bars, points leading in to creeks, drop offs and potholes where grass and sandy spots are together. Moving water is also a key factor, not fast moving current but enough flow for bait to washed by but not so much that the trout have to fight the current. Grass is also a key area. Trout's natural camouflage is the spots on it's back which look like the top off the grass when looking down from above.

I like to make as long a cast as possible and make my retrieve with a pop pop action of the rod tip. Taking up the slack on the fall and repeating this all the way back. I will change the amount of popping and retrieve rate until I find how they are feeding. This is a more effective method if you can keep your jig head as light as possible but still have a steady sink rate. I prefer the Trout Eye jigs from Ralph Phillips Inshore in the 3/16 oz size with either the clear or gold eye.

As far as the body of the lure I have caught more trout, reds, flounder and even striper on the Z Man Trout Trick. Colors unfortunately vary with water clarity and or the sky conditions. I would have to say the "original" color Mood Ring is a starting color most days. Another consistent producer is a paddle tail bait like the 3" MinnowZ also from Z Man Lures. The Elaztech material gives the lure more buoyancy and action to this bait than your standard plastic material found on the market.

Another favorite is a top water walk the dog style lure. There is no more exciting or explosive catch than when a big oi' trout smacks the the lure as it crawls across the top of the water. For these I like either MirrOlures Top Pups or Top Dogs. Another easy to walk would be the Rapala Skitter Walk. A good tip I learned a long time ago from a well respected trout guide is to tie a 12" piece of 30lb leader to your main line and then connect the plug with a loop not. The shorter heavier leader will not sink or slow down the "walking" action of the bait.

I like a fast action 7' rod with a medium to a medium / light backbone. For my casting setup I prefer the Revo Inshore reel. The 7:1 gear ratio helps to pick up that slack line fast so my line is almost always tight. For my spinning set up I go with a Penn ClashII 2000-2500 Soft mouths and slack line are a sure way to loose trout. The reel is spooled with #20 Spiderwire with a 2'-3' piece of fluorocarbon leader of 15-20 pound test.

2nd Annual Stan Sutliff Memorial Surf Tournament Results

The 2nd Annual Stan Sutliff Memorial was even bigger than last year! We had 36 anglers and 53 participants including guests and volunteers. There was a total of \$720 in prizes for competing anglers and a buffet style lunch of fried chicken, baked beans, potato salad, rolls and drinks.

We woke up to a beautifully sunny day with a light east wind. The water was around 78 degrees and clean. Air temperatures were just above that near 80 degrees. You couldn't ask for a finer fall day. Registration opened at 9:00AM to competing anglers. More than 10 anglers were already waiting to sign in at opening. Anglers could help themselves to a doughnut while waiting to register and then file their way on the beach to grab a good spot to fish.

The fishing session would start at 10:00AM. A high tide was expected at 1:30 and anglers would finish fishing at 2:00PM. This would help provide a better fishing opportunity since fish tend to feed better on the beach closer to high tide. Our 36 anglers covered nearly 1000 feet of beach. It was a line of fishing rods as far down as you could see. Fishing was slow at first. Very little if anything was caught in the first 2 hours. At the strike of noon, fishing began to heat up. There were numerous hound fish, roundhead, pompano, flounder and others caught in the last two hours. The majority of these fish were too small to score. Bill Swanner managed a nice 9" roundhead to start off. His fish scored 9 points and was the first on the board. Wesley Waters was next to beach a scoring fish. I could see down the beach a large silvery flash. As I ran over to score the fish, it was a large citation pompano! It was officially measured in at 16 and 1/8 inches. Good for 16 points. While there was plenty more action on the beaches, no more fish were scored in the tournament. Fishing concluded at 2:00PM and anglers dragged their gear off the beach to prepare for lunch.

Lunch began shortly after 2:15PM. We had all the fried chicken and sides you could ever wish for! Anglers were filling their bellies while scores were tallied and awards were prepared. Though we had 144 pieces of chicken, it was nearly finished off, as was all of our sides and drinks. We had an exceptional turnout and everyone enjoyed their day on the beach. The Stan Sutliff Memorial represented the final of our 3 VBAC intraclub surf series events as well. The top 5 finishing anglers will be awarded a surf tournament spot of their choice for 2023. Congratulations to our anglers!



We fished very short-handed this year. Hurricane Fiona presented a daunting weather forecast, so several of those making up our two teams decided against making the trip. The 4 who represented the club were: Captain Doug Wehner, Greg Wehner, Patty Searby and Bill Searby. 



Throwing Instructions for Cast Nets

Pictures shown are for right-handed throwing. To throw left-handed, simply follow instructions using your left hand.



Cinch rope around your right wrist and coil rope into throwing hand as shown.





Hold net by your side resting the weights on the ground and grathen net with your throwing hand at pocket height.





 Grasp the lead line with your free hand at a position straight down from the end of your right thumb and place between thumb and forefinger.



• Grasp the lead line with your free hand at a position about one arms length from your other hand. This will hold the net one quarter open as shown.





Rotate your body back to the right one quarter turn and immediately rotate back to your left releasing the net at a slight upward angle into the air in the direction of your target.

Grasp the horn and release the throw-line to empty the net into bucket or bait well.

- Caring for Your Cast Net
- Prior to using your net, soak it overnight in a solution of about two gallons of water and one capful of fabric softener. This will soften and relax the netting making it lay flatter and throw easier. Do not use any other chemicals on your net.
- Inspect your net before every use, mending any cuts or tears.
- After each use rinse your net with fresh water and hang with the lead line resting on the ground to dry. Store away from direct sunlight.
- Using your net in areas with reefs, rocks, or other submerged objects will lessen the life of your cast net. Avoid these areas if possible.






