

Sandbridge & Little Island Parking

The Parking Management Office operates remote beach parking lots at Sandbridge Beach and Little Island at Sandbridge. Paid parking is seasonal, beginning in May 1st through September 30th. In and out priviledges are permitted at Sandbridge Lot and Little Island parking lots, Sandbridge Market not included. The Sandbridge Lot and LIttle Island lot now offer meter parking and contactless payment options. Sandbridge and Little Island Seasonal Permits can now be purchased online. Please visit <u>VA Beach</u> <u>Permits</u> to set up an account or log into your account to make a payment using a credit card.

Be advised that the Little Island Lot at Sandbridge is very busy on weekends during the summer and long waits to get into the lot can occur after 11:00am. Meter parking and contactless payment options have been put in place to help eliminate some of the wait times. Free overflow parking is available during these peak times, but spaces are limited.

Virginia Beach Senior Citizen Parking Permit

The City of Virginia Beach will provide any Virginia Beach resident 65 or older free parking in the 4th Street municipal parking, Sandbridge municipal parking lots, and Little Island municipal parking lot after applying for the permit.

To Request a Permit

- 1. Go to the **<u>Permit Portal</u>** and log on or create an account.
- 2. Select Senior Citizen Parking Permit.
- 3. Fill in all contact information and vehicle information.
- 4. Upload a copy of drivers license and vehicle registration.
- 5. Click checkout (there is no charge for this decal).

No physical permit will be issued. Permit is based off of license plate number.

Hello Jeff,

As our offshore work on Coastal Virginia Offshore Wind (CVOW) continues, we remain committed to maintaining communications with fishing communities and other mariners in the area via these periodic updates as well as dock visits, informational speaking engagements and additional information posted on the <u>CVOW website</u>.

All mariners are encouraged to contact Dominion Energy's Fisheries Liaisons below with any specific questions about CVOW project activities in relation to fisheries.

Recent announcements include:

 The UXO identification work is underway with the M/V Subsea Responder I and the M/V Subsea Responder II. These vessels utilize Remotely Operated Vehicles (ROVs) to investigate targets identified by the previously conducted survey activities and determine if they are UXO. This operation will begin in the nearshore cable corridor (Area A) and continue offshore through Area B and then into the Lease Area (Area C). These vessels will not be towing any survey equipment and should not pose a hazard to any fixed-gear commercial fishing operations. These operations are expected to continue into the fall of 2023 and any targets confirmed to be UXO will be shared via the <u>USCG 5th District Local</u> <u>Notice to Mariners</u>.

Mariners transiting or fishing in the operational area are requested to provide a 0.5 nautical milewide clearance to survey vessels, which may be limited in their ability to maneuver. Mariners should operate in a manner that will not endanger themselves, the survey vessel or its equipment.

Vessels are requested to avoid anchoring in the identified survey area and fishing vessels deploying fixed fishing gear (e.g., pots, traps, gillnets, etc.) are requested to coordinate activities with the Fisheries Liaison to avoid damage to fishing gear and/or the survey equipment.

CVOW and Fisheries Resource Surveys

In partnership with the <u>Virginia Institute of Marine Science</u> (VIMS), Dominion Energy is conducting resource assessment studies for Black Sea Bass, Atlantic Surfclam and Channeled Whelk in the project area.

Black Sea Bass: The study consists of 8-strings of ventless traps with 6-traps per string. Sampling once per month with a 48-hour soak utilizing acoustic release buoys to recover gear. Randomly selected sampling sites will be inside lease with control sites area outside lease area. Sampling will begin in June 2023 utilizing the VIMS R/V Bay Eagle.

Atlantic Surfclam: With support from Rutgers University, the commercial F/V Joey D will sample 20-stations inside lease and 20-stations outside (40-sample tows in total). The work will take place June 18 and June 19, 2023 and will take 2-3 days to complete; sampling stations are shown in the chart below.

Channeled Whelk: Study design is complete and sampling gear is being acquired. This is a cooperative study that plans to utilize commercial whelk fishermen and their vessels. Fishermen interested in participating should contact the Dominion Energy Fisheries Liason.





This Year's Inaugural Marc Wray Memorial Tournament offered VBAC anglers other fishing opportunities besides surf. Chris Schneider arranged a ½ day charter out of Hatteras Harbor aboard the <u>Adventure</u> for club members George Gabriel, Gerry Mariano, Eric Whisman and of course Chris himself. The beauty of the OBX fishing scene is that even a ½ day trip offers anglers diversity in selecting targeted species for the trip. The captain's morning charter came back with limits of nice size blue fish and Spanish mackerel. The boat moored adjacent to ours came back from their morning trip with a mixed bag of cobia, amberjack, and Spanish. We informed our captain that we wanted to fish where they had gone.

Our compliant skipper swapped out some tackle and gear, grabbed his cast net, and headed out to catch some bait to catch some big fish. His third cast of the net yielded a load that proved to be a struggle even for him to pull on board. The abundance was so great, he had plenty to share with fellow charters. With the bait well full, we headed to some structure he knew was holding fish. The ride was comfortable- the wind gods showed us their favor! Pulling up to his spot, the mate loaded our lines with live bait, which we happily tossed over the side. With only 2 ounces of lead (at the most), our live baits meandered down towards the ocean's depths (about 75 feet). Eric's line was the first to sound off, line whizzing off at a brisk clip. Calmly negotiating with his undersea predator, Eric soon boated a 20lb red snapper- which of course after his photo op ended- had to go back into the sea. A beautiful fish non the less.

Didn't take long before all the lines took turns hooking nice amberjacks- which of course offer a nice fight. The captain decided to have George try live-lining a spot; which when hitting the water took off for points unknown. Not long after the line screamed off the reel, and unlike the amberjack and other bottom dwellers, this fish took off climbing the water column much like a cobia would. The fish fought for several minutes during which Chris reminisced about his bucket list desire to catch an African Pompano. Thank you to all the VBAC volunteers who helped to make this day memorable.




Virginia Beach Anglers Club Charter 6/3/23:

I was picked from a lottery of VBAC members for this trip on Havoc Charter's HAVOC 2 along with Rob Stummel, Marshall Weathers, Christina Morse, Mike Kreckle and Ronnie Willoughby. The boat was the Ocean Pearl that Captain Brandon Baldwin bought from Steve Wray of Long Bay Point. We boarded at Southall Landings Marina on the Salt Ponds in Hampton. We went to Chesapeake Light Tower which was a 2 hour trip in pea soup thick fog for spadefish. Luckily the wind was barely present which of course kept the fog thick through the whole trip but made for a smooth riding trip. When we got there it was pretty crowded there. We had to re-anchor several times since some were catching a few that were positioned close to the tower. Christina caught the first fish which was 19 inches long and looked about 5lbs. Then Rob hooked up the next one which was about 20 inches long and a little heavier. Finally I got a 6lb 2oz, a club minimum in after I pulled the hook on an earlier caught fish. Fish were right on the bottom. When we finally figured it out and got in closer to the tower the wind blew up bad. Despite 3-5 ft seas that boat is a smooth riding boat for rough seas like we had heading back. The CLT was just too far a trip for that boat. 
Another CLT trip 6/8/23:

We could see decent sized spades getting caught close in to the tower where most people were. Most had trolling motors on with Spot Lock holding their positions. It took us a while to get anchored in a good position when I caught the first spade, a 5lb fish. Soon after that I caught my big one at 7lbs 3ozs a club minimum on my scale verified at Long Bay Point as well. Pete caught a nice one too but we didn't weight it. The a major thunderstorm with lightning pulled in the area soaking us so we headed home in 3-5 foot waves. Well that's all I'm doing at the CLT. Pirate's Cove Billfish Tournament Celebrates 40 Years of Big Game Competition Manteo, North Carolina

June 29. 2023

Celebrating its 40th anniversary this year, the Pirate's Cove Billfish Tournament is gearing up for another memorable event as top teams throughout the Mid-Atlantic compete in the fertile waters off North Carolina's Outer Banks. The latest edition will feature a purse topping the million-dollar mark, competitive entry categories and a charity raffle to benefit the local community.

Again this year the PCBT will offer split entries on all but the Base Category for tournament boats. Non Omni Directional Sonar boats can expect to pay approximately \$15,500 across the board with an additional \$1,000 to enter the charity Lay Day Tournament. Boats that plan on deploying an Omni Directional Sonar at any time during fishing hours will enter separate categories with additional fees totaling just over \$25,000 including the charity event.

"Our Omni/Non-Omni split registration is designed to level the playing field yet still allow boats that wish to use the technology the opportunity for additional payouts. The split option has been well received by the teams," says Tournament Director Heather Maxwell. The 34th Annual Alice Kelly Memorial Ladies Only Billfish Tournament, one of the largest lady angler only competitive sport-fishing event in the world, will not allow Omni Directional Sonar to be deployed during the event. The ladies event precedes the PCBT.

"Oregon Inlet is finally perfect," Maxwell adds. "The channel is fully dredged and in great shape and there are no height clearance issues for the larger tower boats. We also have four Yeti Ice Tanks filled with fishing and hunting trips and other great prizes that we'll be raffling off to benefit our local charities."

The Alice Kelly Memorial allows pre-registration on Friday, 8/11, at the Pavilion at the Pirate's Cove Marina. Regular registration is Saturday, 8/12, followed by the festive kick-off party, with fishing on Sunday, August 13th. The Pirate's Cove Billfish Tournament starts on Monday, August 14th, with fishing slated for August 15-18, 2023. Advance registration for both tournaments is available on-line at www.pcbgt.com




