



This past June, July and August, we held 4 out of 5 planned Kids Surf Fishing outings on the beach in the Back Bay National Wildlife Area, in conjunction with the National Park Service, the Norfolk Anglers Club, the Tidewater Anglers Club, the Great Bridge Fisherman's Association and the Virginia Beach Anglers Club. Our first event in June was cancelled due to weather conditions, however the two events in July, and the two in August were all highly successful. Each Thursday, we had between 10 and 15 children fishing in the surf. The kids had a wide range of skills, from zero to fully functioning. The program was well supported by members from each of the local clubs, NAC, TAC, GBFA & VBAC, and I'd like to take this opportunity to thank everyone who came out to support these events. They all contributed to making sure the kids had a good time. The biggest fish caught was a 2# roundhead, and some of the times, all the children caught fish. They also learned how to dig for sand fleas. Needless to say, some days were better than others, but all in all, I think the program was well supported, the children had a good time, and we're planning to do it again next summer.





3rd Annual Stan Sutliff Memorial Tournament Guidelines and Rules



Anglers are responsible for:

- Arrive early enough to allow adequate time to set-up!
- Providing all equipment, bait, and tackle required to participate in the event.
- Having all appropriate licenses, passes/stickers, parking fees/permits, and observing/knowing all applicable fishing regulations, size limits, and published VBAC rules.
- All participants registered for the Stan Sutliff Memorial Tournament assume all risks while fishing or volunteering for the event and will not hold the Virginia Beach Anglers Club liable for injury or otherwise.

Anglers shall follow these rules:

- The Stan Sutliff Memorial Tournament is an Individual Tournament. Scores will be kept individually.
- > Tournament anglers are required to be affiliated with one of the participating south-side anglers clubs to include: Tidewater Anglers Club, Great Bridge Fisherman's Association, Norfolk Anglers Club and/or the Virginia Beach Anglers Club.
- Anglers who do not register by the deadline are not guaranteed entry to the tournament. Early registration ensures that there is enough fishing space, judges and food for competitors.
- At no time shall any angler have more than one line in the water.
- Float rigs, balloons, plastic bags, etc. will not be allowed. No cast nets may be used during a fishing session. Chumming or chum pots at any time are not permitted. Anglers doing so will be disqualified.
- Not more than two hooks are allowed on one line at any time with the exception of two double hooked rigs, and artificial lures with hooks according to manufacturer's specifications.
- All tournament fish must be caught on hook or lure and landed on the beach by the angler.
- No lines are permitted to be in the water prior to starting time. All lines must be reeled in at the stopping time. Any fish hooked prior to end of the session will be scored when landed.
- > It is the angler's responsibility to fish within the boundaries of the designated fishing area.
- All fish shall be measured from the tip of the snout to the compressed tip of the tail once it has been determined the fish meets the minimum legal-size limit.
- Largest fish divisions will be determined by length to the nearest eighth inch. A time will be recorded for tie-breaking purposes for red drum, bluefish and roundhead divisions
- > Any angler with questionable fish as determined by the Chief Judge, will be disqualified from the competition.
- In the event that an angler is unable to physically cast for themselves, a designated casting person must be identified in writing before fishing begins.
- > The event winner is determined by total points scored. First tiebreaker is total number of fish caught. Second tiebreaker is largest fish caught. If still tied, a winner will be determined by the flip of a coin by the Chief Judge.
- While waiting for a judge, anglers must place their fish in a bucket of water until a judge is available. Each Angler should have their own 5-gallon bucket.
- > If an angler chooses to keep a legal fish, that fish must have a fin of the judges' choice clipped.
- > A paying division or placement that does not have a winner will not be awarded to an angler.

NOTE: The rules governing this tournament were compiled for the purpose of establishing a set of rules that would be fair to all and to give all a chance to win on equal footing.

The Virginia Beach Angler's Club trusts that the rules will be accepted in good faith by all registered anglers.

In the event of adverse weather, the Tournament Committee has the right to adjust tournament fishing times without notice as to prevent endangering the anglers, judges, or volunteers.

Scoring:

- a. Fish will be measured from the tip of the snout to the tip of the tail.
- **b.** Fish will be scored 1 point per inch and .5 points per half inch.
- c. Any scoreable fish less than 8 inches will not be scored.
- **d.** Any scoreable fish 8 inches or greater will be scored based on the total length of the fish in inches rounded to the nearest half inch.
- **e.** Fish which have a minimum size limit to possess will be required to meet that minimum size limit in order to be measured by a judge and for a score to be recorded for the angler. Fish that do not meet any state or federally regulated minimum size limit should be released immediately back into the water.
- **f.** Fish which have a slot limit will be scored if greater than the maximum slot limit size. A judge should be alerted immediately if a potential over-slot fish is caught.
- g. Only fish on the list of scoreable fishes will be scored in the tournament. These fish include: Black Drum, Bluefish, Bonita, Bonito, Cobia, Croaker, Dolphin (Mahi), Flounder, Grey Trout, King Mackerel, Northern Puffer, Pompano, Red Drum, Roundhead (Kingfish), Sheepshead, Spadefish, Spanish Mackerel, Speckled Trout, Spot, Striped Bass.
- **h.** In order for a fish to be scored, the fish must be personally handed or delivered to the judge directly or be placed in their bucket for scoring. If there is any question as to the validity of who caught a fish, the fish will not be scored for any angler.
- i. Any tournament qualifying fish that is kept for consumption or otherwise, must have a fin of the judges' choice clipped to identify the fish as being previously measured and scored.
- **j.** In the event of any discrepancy for the scoring of a fish, the Chief Judge should be consulted and their decision will be final.
- **k.** The Chief Judge has the right to change the list of eligible scoring species at any time prior to the start of competition. All anglers will be alerted to any changes at tournament registration.

Examples of scoring: A 14 inch bluefish scores 14 points. A 9 inch spot scores 9 points. A 37 inch red drum scores 37 points. A 15 inch flounder is not scorable. A 7 inch roundhead is not scoreable.



N. C. Flounder Rules

REMINDER: 2023 Recreational flounder season opening dates, harvest areas, and possession limits

Earlier this summer, the N.C. Division of Marine Fisheries announced the 2023 recreational flounder season in accordance with Amendment 3 of the North Carolina Flounder Fishery Management Plan. The 2023 recreational flounder season for Coastal and Joint Fishing Waters will open at 12:01 a.m. on Friday Sept. 15, 2023, and will remain open until 11:59 p.m. Friday, Sept. 29, 2023. The possession limit will be one flounder per person per day. The minimum size limit will be 15 inches total length (from the tip of the snout to the tip of the tail). Harvest of flounder with a Recreational Commercial Gear License is prohibited.

The fisheries management measures implemented by the Marine Fisheries Commission and the Division of Marine Fisheries are science-based and required by law to ensure the long-term viability of the State's commercially and recreationally significant species. Ending overfishing and rebuilding overfished stocks within the timeline set out in the Fishery Management Plans is essential for the conservation of these fish for the enjoyment of current and future North Carolinians.

Marine Fisheries Commission Rule 15A NCAC 03I.0120 prohibits the possession or transport of flounder through Coastal or Joint Fishing Waters (Coastal and Joint Waters descriptive boundaries) when those waters are closed to flounder harvest, regardless of where the species was taken.

The N.C. Division of Marine Fisheries, in collaboration with other states, including South Carolina, Georgia, and Florida, are updating the Southern Flounder coast-wide stock assessment. While North Carolina data are showing improved abundance of flounder, the coastwide assessment will provide a science-based approach to determine the state of the stock overall. Results from this assessment are expected to be completed and presented to the Marine Fisheries Commission in 2024.


Summer Trout: 8/30/23 at Little Creek

My family moved from San Diego to Virginia Beach for military orders in the summer of 2020. As providence would have it, we moved into a neighborhood with several retention ponds. My 8-year-old kept asking to go fishing, but I didn't know the first thing about fishing.

My new coworkers all had great ideas on how to fix the problem. They mentioned places like Elizabeth River, Mt. Trashmore Lake, and North Landing River. Those locations, while wonderful, all required travel time, parking, and equipment. Standing on the edge of the cement bank of our HOA-owned retention pond, I wondered... could I teach my daughter to fish here? Would she catch anything? For that matter, could I improve enough to fish with my experienced friends in the larger Hampton Roads area?

Thankfully, I learned through this process that local retention ponds offered my family several advantages. The ponds were close to ou house, so the time and travel commitment was more reasonable. They had a variety of hungry fish, so my daughter could apply basic skills for catching perch and other panfish while I could work on bass and catfish proficiency. Finally, fishing at our local retention ponds came with less pressure to catch a "whopper." No one would judge me for bringing in a laughably small fish at one of our neighborhood ponds. Applying these ideas to your next outing can help you teach your little ones to fish and increase your skill level, too.




