The Fish of 1000 Casts By Pete Federico

It was late October 1973, My dad and his friend would always reserve the third week of October to travel to the 1000 Islands in Clayton New York. Their quest? Muskellunge, muskie, the Fish of 1000 casts. The first time they went was circa 1970, and they hired a guide whose name fails me now. Two days of fishing yielded some of the biggest Northern Pike either my dad or his friend Doug ever caught, but no muskie.

The following year they did some homework and hired a young guide named Clayton Ferguson Jr. Now one does not usually hire a guide in his early 20's, but Clay's dad was known as THE muskie guide in the 1000 Islands, so they decided to give "Muskie Ferg Jr." a try. That year Doug nabbed a 46 pounder, and Dad brought in a 26 pounder.

The following year I joined them for my first trip, and drew the first fish (I think it was fixed) so the first fish was mine. By then, Clay was well known as the up and coming guide and was often followed by other boats while trolling his favorite spots. Clay would have his wire lines measured and marked with either paint or nail polish every 25 yards so he would know exactly how much line was out. With that and what speed he was trolling he knew what depth the lures were swimming. With two or three boats following, Clay instructed my dad and Doug to crank up the lines about 50 yards while he slowly goosed the throttle to bring the lures almost to the top of the water. The boats behind stayed right with us, Clay the guided us over a very thick weed bed. After he was sure the other boats were pretty well entangled in the weeds, he pulled the boat back to the edge of the weeds and had us drop the lines to their original distance. Once the lines were back out, a tug to check the drag and we were fishing again. Within 5 minutes one of the Penn reels was singing "FISH ON". Clay knew that the fish on the end of the line was not very big. but was definitely a muskie. It was a light fight, 5 minutes or so and we had a 15-pound muskie in the net. Not a prize fish, so it was released. But I did it! I landed my first muskie at 11 years old.

Now the next year, It was the day before my 12th birthday, October 22, 1973, and I drew second fish. We had been trolling about an hour and a half, and I was bored. I decided to mess with the guys and give the reel a good hard tug and make them think there was a fish on... I gave it a hard yank, and the reel screamed, causing the three men in the cabin to whip their heads around thinking there was a fish on. They found me standing there laughing, until the reel peeled off another 15 yards of line. A muskie must have been following the lure and hit it just after I pulled on the line. Doug grabbed the rod and began fighting the fish. Twenty minutes later, he landed a 22 pounder, and it was released. The next fish was mine. About an hour later, one of the lines began howling, and I remember hearing Clay say "that's a big one". The rod was handed to me and I started cranking, I remember hearing things like, "Don't horse it" and "Let it run" and "Don't give him slack". Clay was running the boat in a large concentric circle keeping the fish in the "bull's-eye" of the circle. I remember my hands cramping, and my father saying "If I touch that rod, it's not your fish!" I cranked, complained, ached, and kept cranking. A half-hour into the fight, the fish broke water and danced on its tail, thrashing his head back and forth. Then he ran another 30 yards or so. but the tension was kept on the line and it did not get loose. As the fish tired, the circles Clay was running got smaller and smaller. The fish was tiring, and so was I. Gradually, I was able to gain more real estate between the fish and the boat, until it was about 20 feet from the boat and it lunged out of the water again, this time with less enthusiasm than the first. I was finally able to get the fish alongside the boat and Doug gaffed the fish. While it was being pulled over the side, the fish whipped its head one last time, and the plug broke in half at one of the joints. the half attached to the line went flying, and the tail half still hooked in the muskie's mouth on the deck of the boat.

The fish was mine! A 32 pound 6 ounce muskie, and I came in second that year in the tournament.




